

he four College Station neighborhoods shown above have been designated by City Planner Bill Koehler as areas eligible to benefit from funding granted through the Community Development Act of 1974.

In the past two weeks residents of the four neighborhoods met on separate dates with Al Mayo of the city planner's office to discuss the priorities of services needed in their particular areas. The city has been allocated \$71,000 for this year under the program, which was created to consolidate and replace similar programs including Urban Renewal and Model Cities.

To receive the funding, the residents of the areas to be affected must have an opportunity to participate in setting spending priorities and approving final expenditures. The money must be used in low to middle income areas or for urgent community development needs and the city must show that the work done is environmentally

Next year the city will have to prepare a performance report of work being done with the funds for the Department of Housing and Urban Development which operates the program. Pending the approvel of HUD, the city will receive \$169,000 next year and \$257,000 in 1977

under the program. Representatives of the four neighborhoods, called the Citizens Advisory Group, will meet with the city Planning and Zoning Commission Monday to determine which projects will receive the top priority rating. The public hearing will be in the A&M Consolidated High School Auditorium at 7:30 p.m.

Priorities outlined in the neighborhood meetings

centered around the need for street paving, proper drainage and adequate water pressure.
