## Rebate plan helps hike auto sales

DETROIT (AP) — New car sales strengthened in late January as cash rebate plans spurred auto deliveries an estimated 36 per cent above mid-January levels, industry analysts said Tuesday. But the unusual discounting moves apparently failed to lift the ailing industry out of its worst slump since World War II, Chrysler Corp. figures indicated.

Total January sales were expected to be the lowest for the month since 1961 and mark the 16th consecutive month that deliveries have lagged behind year-earlier levels.

Import sales were expected to be 80,000 to 90,000, a 29 to 37 per cent decline from 126,600 in January 1974.

Chrysler Corp., the first auto maker to offer discounts on some new cars, reported Tuesday its sales in Jan. 21-31 were up 17 per cent from the middle 10 days of the month, based on the daily selling rate.

American Motors reported sales of 10,804 in the final January period, a 58 per cent increase over mid-January, based on the daily selling rate.

However, the company's deliveries in the period were down 23 per cent from Jan. 21-31, 1974, and sales of 20,309 for the entire month were off 37 per cent from 32,365 the year before.

General Motors was to report its figures late Tuesday, and Ford Motor Co. will report Wednesday.

Chrysler, which saw its sales increase from 11,654 in early January and 23,608 in mid-month to 34,543 in the final 10 days, attributed the gains to its rebate plan, which ends Feb. 16.

But Chrysler's monthly deliveries of 70,619 were off 30 per cent from 100,150 the year before, making it the company's worst January in 11 years.

The final January figures are the first to reflect the full effect of \$200 to \$600 rebates the companies began offering on some new models in midmonth to perk up sagging sales.

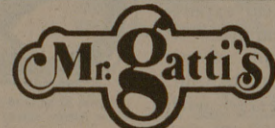
