

## Scott joins expedition of Russians

U.S. scientists are joining a Russian scientific team aboard the "Akademik Kurchatov" late this month.

Among the personnel on this oceanographic expedition is A&M geologist Dr. Robert Scott. The cruise will take them from New York to the Mid-Atlantic Ridge, where Scott earlier helped discover a submarine hydrothermal field to study mineral deposits on the Atlantic Ocean floor.

On a 1972 cruise with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) the hydrothermal field was located in the rift valley of the ridge at 26 degrees north latitude during the Trans-Atlantic Geotraverse (TAG) project.

The submarine region is where the minerals were dissolved in the hot water then precipitated on the ocean floor as it comes in contact with cold seawater. Mining two miles beneath the ocean may become common with the exhaustion of minerals on the continental crust.

The expedition will dredge rocks from the bottom, run geo-physical surveys over the region, collect water samples and core the sediments.

Both Russian and U.S. scientists will study the samples and publish the conclusions in joint reports.

## TAMU team now attempts chimp's talk

Lilly is a chimpanzee and the subject of a unique research project here.

A team will attempt to teach Lilly to communicate in American Sign Language, then ask her questions in sign to see if she has an advanced thought process.

Success has already been measured in teaching other chimps sign. One from Nevada named Washoe knows nearly 200 signs and can make sentences and phrases, said Washoe's human researcher in a recent lecture at TAMU.

The workers are looking for complex questions since even dogs and parrots can be trained to perform acts when triggered by signs or voices. In other words, Lilly will have to do more than write the answer to "how much is two plus two" on the chalkboard.

Dr. Ordean Oyen, physical anthropologist, is leading the project which involves Lilly's owner, graduate student Alyse Moore and senior Phil Dering.

"Efforts at such research have been attempted at only a very few institutions," said Oyen.

The structure of the experiment, coupled with a chance for communication, would yield valuable first-hand findings on behavior and development of chimps, he explained.
