Coaches busy arranging personnel It's almost spring football time

It is hardly Spring, but nevertheless preparations for the upcoming training sessions are already underway.

The Texas A&M football coaches are busily arranging their personnel to fill the vacant gaps left by graduation. Changes in the offensive system and strategy is another area under the coaches' scrutiny.

On defense, Lester Hayes will be moved from linebacker to strong safety. Tim Gray and James Daniels wear the Maroon and White no more as they have joined the ranks of the professionals. The defensive secondary will have Pat Thomas, Jackie Williams and either Mike Williams or Tony Blankenship fighting for the other spot.

Jimmy Dean replaces Warren Trahan in the line and Edgar Fields takes over where Ted Lamp left off. Tank Marshall also figures in the picture for defensive lineman.

Defensive coach Melvin Robertson is pleased with the depth of his defense which is one thing he says a team has "got to have." Robertson said, "We're in the position where we can start a guy in every spot, except where Tim was, who has played a lot." He said the defense

Hoosiers still king of the hill

(AP) - Indiana, which needs to beat Michigan State on Saturday to finish the regular season unbeaten, again was unchallenged as the No. 1 team in the weekly Associated Press major college basketball poll. The Big Ten Conference champ-

ions victimized Illinois and Ohio State last week for a 28-0 record. As a result, the Hoosiers cornered all 41 first-place votes and 820 points from a nationwide panel of sports writers and broadcasters.

Maryland, which takes a 22-3 record into the Atlantic Coast Conference playoffs after finishing the regular season with triumphs over Duquesne, Clemson and East Tennessee State, remained second with 716 points. Louisville, 22-2 with one game to go after beating West Texas State and North Texas State last week, held on to third with 667 points.

However, Kentucky 21-4 after splitting the week's card with a loss to unranked Florida and a victory over Vanderbilt, slipped from fourth to sixth place with 409 points. had good depth last year and has "a good chance to have it this time." No changes in alignment for the defense are planned, it will remain the same 4-3 configuration. "It will look the same from the stands," said

Spring training will start on April 1 following the holidays. At that time, the plans for next season will be taken off the chalkboard and put on the field for the first time.

Trailing Kentucky in the Top 10 are Alabama, North Carolina State, Arizona State and Pennsylvania. Alabama, 22-3, moved up from

eighth with victories over Georgia and Florida. Defending national champion North Carolina State dropped to eighth place after losing to North Carolina and edging UNC-Charlotte for a 20-5 record. Arizona State, 22-3, remained No. 9 and Ivy League champion Penn held on to 10th.

Southern Cal, 18-6, is No. 11 in the standings released Tuesday, followed by North Carolina, 18-7 Creighton, 19-4; Clemson, 16-9; Oregon State, 17-9; Notre Dame, 18-8; Pan American, 22-2; Texas-El Paso, 19-5; Arizona 20-5, and Rutgers, 20-6.
