Economist Gordon Tullock continues the Great Issues Series Thursday at 8 p.m. in the Rudder

Tullock will outline the socioeconomic views of crime and lead up to the much talked about paradox

capital punishment, need or evil. Tullock is considered one of the most outstanding figures on the economics of crime. Presently a professor of Economics and Free Choice at Virginia Polytechnic Institute Center for Study of Public Choice, he received his law degree at the University of Chicago and has studied at several of the foremost universities. While serving in the United States Foreign Services he studied Chinese and related fields in Southeast Asia.
