is pitching for the Bryan American Legion team that will be playing in, and hosting, the State American Legion Tournament, August 12, at Travis Park.

Calf recipe

JELLY GLAZED CALF SAUTE

1 1/2 lbs. calf steak (sirloin, round or tip)
3 tbs. fat
1/2 cup currant jelly
1/2 cup boiling water

Cut calf steak in 1" cubes and roll in seasoned flour. Sauté in fat until browned. Cover. Cook slowly about 1/2 hr., turning frequently. Heat currant jelly until it melts. Add boiling water to jelly. Pour over meat and cook until slightly glazed, stirring constantly. Serve on hot platter with steamed rice. Serves 6.

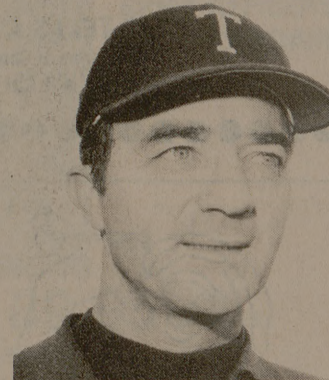

Aggie club gives money to athletics

The athletic scholarship program at Texas A&M is \$200,000 richer these days.

The Aggie Club presented the check to Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Emory Bellard at the Houston A&M Club's annual Kick-Off dinner at the Marriott Motor Hotel Monday night.

Cyrus Johnston, Aggie Club President, made the presentation of the check before more than 900 Aggie football fans.

The check was the final payment of \$260,500 the club has given to the athletic department this year.

The Aggie Club is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization that raises funds to finance athletic scholarships for Texas A&M athletes. The athletic department must operate only on funds from gate receipts, television and bowl receipts and from donations such as those provided by the Aggie Club.

Johnston noted that many of the crowd present were members of the club and had made the large check possible through their generous gifts.

"Houston gave us the greatest amount of financial support this year," said Johnston. "We have had a record year in fund-raising through the Aggie Club and want to thank you for it, and to remind you to renew your gifts next year as well."

Bellard thanked Johnston and the club for their support. "It's always great to receive the fine backing of so many people," Bellard said. "Aggies have always been great supporters of their school and their football, and this check proves it."
