

# Ags are 11-pt favs

**NEW YORK** — The only thing that seems to change about the Rose Bowl is the roses.

Although the college football season is only into its third full week, it seems as though Pasadena will be getting Part Four of that continuing series, "New Year's Day with Ohio State and Southern Cal."

It's happened the last three seasons, with the Rose Bowl — the showcase game between the best from the Big 10 and the Pacific 8 — running that old favorite, the Buckeyes against the Trojans.

Ohio State, the Big Ten titan, is once again playing its bully boy act in the Midwest, while Southern Cal, the Pacific 8 elitist, is still kicking sand over its foes on the West Coast.

In the tradition of freshman Archie Griffin, sophomore Archie Griffin and junior Archie Griffin, Archie Griffin is still running Ohio State's opposition ragged. Last week the 1974 Heisman Trophy winner flashed for 128 yards — his 23rd straight 100-plus regular sea-

son game — in the Buckeyes' 17-9 victory over stubborn Penn State.

Meanwhile, in the tradition of Mike Garrett, O. J. Simpson and Anthony Davis, there is Ricky Bell, the tailback sensation who has rushed for 471 yards in the Trojan's two games this season. Last week, Bell rushed for 215 yards and two touchdowns in leading Southern Cal over Oregon State 24-7.

More of the same is expected Saturday when No. 2 Ohio State gives North Carolina a dose of northern inhospitality 42-12 and No. 3 Southern Cal burns Purdue 27-7.

No. 1 Oklahoma at Miami, Fla.: The Sooners hope Florida's fun and sun will bolster a sagging offense that only piled up 46 points last week after 62 the week before. The sky's the limit here . . . Oklahoma 72, Miami 6.

Texas Christian at No. 4 Nebraska: In picking Indiana over Nebraska last week, I missed by a mere 46 points. Maybe the pick made Indiana over-confident. In any case, the gracious Cornhuskers awarded me the game ball. If they fill it with hot air, it would be appropriate

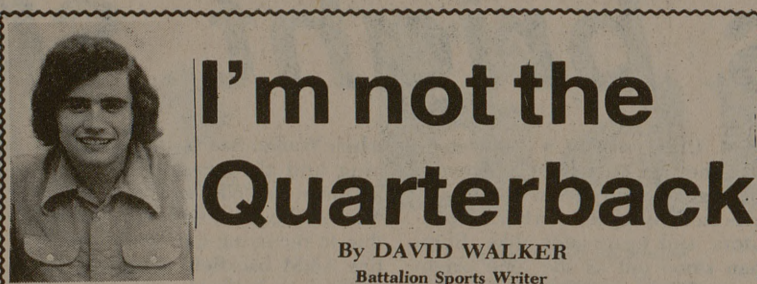

Among Division II schools, Missouri Valley was on top followed by William Penn of Iowa.

Others in the top 10 of Division I, in order: Jackson State, Miss.; Henderson State, Ark.; Livingston Uni-

versity, Ala.; Eastern New Mexico; Abilene Christian, Tex.; Fairmont State, W. Va.; Kentucky State, and University of Wisconsin, LaCrosse.

Others in the Division II top 10, in order: Northwestern, Iowa; Texas Lutheran; California Lutheran; Westminster, Pa.; Pacific Lutheran; Hanover, Ind.; Illinois Wesleyan, and Minot State, N.D.

Division I second 10: Minnesota-Duluth; Langston, Okla.; Wisconsin-River Falls; Winona, Minn.; Hillsdale, Mich.; Missouri Southern; tie between Southwestern Oklahoma and Texas Southern; Northeastern Oklahoma, and Norfolk State, Va.

Division II second 10: Hastings, Neb.; Saginaw Valley, Mich.; Milton, Wis.; Dickinson, N.D.; Linfield, Ore.; Valley City, N.D.; Carthage, Wis.; Redlands, Calif.; Midland Lutheran, Neb., and Missouri Western.
