It is this lack of unlimited financial resources that many of the speakers referred to.
Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong explained why this lack is an asset. "The opposition asks why we don't have a lot of money. My answer is that if there were special interest groups favored, we would have plenty of money."
Hill expressed the importance of a new document. "I'd rather write my life to something that was written in 1975 by people looking me in

the eye," he said, "than to something that someone produced in 1876."
"This is a people's document that is being produced," Hill continued. "You can understand it." Unlike the old constitution he said, "It looks like a constitution, it reads like one, it acts like one, it's organized like one. It is just a better document."
Hill urged the student leaders to "work like you've never worked before. Young people should make

the difference," he continued, "There should not be a young person in this state vote against the constitution."
"A lot of people say you're lazy, that you won't work. I don't believe that. I believe you can make the difference."

Club allotted new space for motorcycle parking

With crowded parking lots and congested streets prevalent on campus, cars are giving way to motorcycles as a means for quick and efficient transportation for Aggies on and off campus.
The Texas A&M Motorcycle Club was formed in 1974 to give motorcyclists an organization that could offer fellowship, contests and entertainment. But the main purpose of the club, according to club president Tom Garney, is to develop safe and responsible motorcyclists at A&M.

In recent weeks the club has been given space for new parking lots for motorcycles around the perimeter of campus. These new lots, located on Spence Street by Zachry Engineering Center, are replacing some of the inner campus lots.
"The school is trying to close off all inner-campus parking lots and

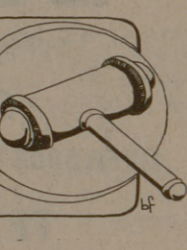
streets," said Garney, "and build more perimeter lots. Motorcyclists should not get upset with the closing of the lots inside campus, because we'll have more spaces and as good a parking location as many faculty and staff members will."
Recently, Garney became disturbed when he heard that motorcyclists were making unnecessary noise and becoming a nuisance of Legett Hall.
"I was upset because I did not want to see the reputation of the majority of motorcyclists at A&M become tarnished because of the thoughtless actions of a few. The main reason we have gotten the two lots were because we have been good motorists," Garney said. "I want to urge all Aggie motorcycle

riders to observe speed limits, and drive quietly and cautiously while on campus," said Garney.

Garney and Vice-President Frank Fitzpatrick outlined some of the planned and tentative events of the club for the upcoming year. The club plans an exhibit by the Memorial Student Center fountain, October 28 and 29, with films and various types of bikes being displayed. On October 31, the club is planning a trip to the Wursthfest in New Braunfels. At the end of each semester, the club has a big bash party with the tab being picked up by the club.
This spring, the club plans a weekend excursion and campout to Canyon Lake in south central Texas.

Food, drink, and tent are provided by the club, and so is the "Truck", a unique truck that carries gas and other kinds of assistance. Broken-down bikes could use a trip. Later in the spring the club plans to show the original motorcycle movie, "The Wild One", starring Marlon Brando. They also plan a 1,000-mile "Spring Break Tour".
The Texas A&M Motorcycle Club is a combination Dirt and Street bike club, and is open to all Aggies. Dues are \$5 for a full year, including summer, or \$2 per semester. 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Corps (Jrs. & Srs.) — Midnights

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To be eligible to purchase the Texas A&M ring, an undergraduate student must have at least one year in residence and credit for at least ninety-two (92) semester hours. A year in residence may consist of the Fall and Spring semesters or one of the above and a full Summer session (both the first and second terms). The hours passed at the preliminary grade report period on October 22, 1975 may be used in satisfying this ninety-two hour requirement. Students qualifying under this regulation should leave their names with the ring clerk, room seven, Richard Coke Building. This should be done prior to October 22nd in order for all records to be checked to determine ring eligibility. Students already having ninety-two (92) completed hours on record may order at any time. Regular orders are mailed once a month. Graduate students are eligible to order with proof (receipt) that they have filed for graduation. Orders for mid-semester will be taken by the ring clerk starting October 23rd, 1975, and will continue until December 2, 1975. Students who graduate during this period may order after final grades are released. All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Students will save time if they will bring grade reports along when ready to order. Students who have failed to leave their names in advance will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked. The rings are due to arrive at the Registrar's Office on January 25, 1976.
All rings ordered, regardless of whether on October 23, 1975 or December 2, 1975, will arrive on October 23, 1975. The ring clerk is on duty from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. each week, Monday through Friday. However, in order for records to be checked, orders must be placed prior to 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. We hope this information will be helpful and extend our congratulations.
