Marijuana found in plane crash

HOUSTON — A light airplane crash-landed on the southwest side of Houston about 5 a.m. today and police said they found two tons of marijuana in the slightly damaged craft

Officers said there apparently was only one person aboard and he quickly disappeared on foot, an indication any injuries he suffered were slight. The plane went down behind the

Meyerland Shopping Center in Bel-laire, an island city surrounded by Houston. One of the first policemen on the scene, reporting there was little damage, said, "This thing is full of marijuana.


Authorities said they found no registration of the aircraft in Houston. They theorized its 4,000-pound load of marijuana came from Mexico.




