





# **Aggies win SWC title** by crushing Rice, 98-67

The Texas Aggies finished a controversy-filled regular season with a victory that should quiet the non-believers. The Ags devastated the last place Rice Owls 98-67, to clinch the Southwest Conference championship for the second straight year

The upset-minded Owls savored an early lead of 4-0 when the Ags' Ray Roberts took the matter into his own hands. Roberts boosted the Ags into a 10-6 lead with less than five minutes gone. Rice called time out, but it did not slow the Ags as they romped to a 33-17 lead and went into the locker room at half leading by a comfortable 51-34 margin. Roberts scored 14 of those first half points before taking a seat on the bench and

watching the margin stretch. With their 51 points in the first, the Ags broke the school scoring re-cord. They ended the night, having
