This is going to be the first year both trials and finals will be held at the women's meet. Fosdick thinks this should prove to be an edge for A&M because of long distances and two-a-day workouts that are part of the swimmers' training.

The diving hopes were dimmed when the single woman diver Jeannie Neilson hurt her foot on the board during Monday workout. She had looked like a Nationals possibility, Fosdick said.

The relays have been A&M's stronghold in the past, but Texas' depth could prove to be the undoing of this claim. Fosdick figures Texas will beat A&M on depth and A&M will beat SMU on the same criteria. He admitted it was wrong to expect the kind of depth Texas has from walk-ons because A&M is not known for its swimming program, especially in the women's program. He says the word's getting out now that there are a number of women on scholarships.

Fosdick feels the women are ready to swim their best, not looking at any particular school for special com-


