The trend in this young season has been for the Ags to fall behind early, only to erase the deficit with a combination of explosive hitting, excellent base running and superb bullpen assistance.

game, as Sam Houston lit up the scoreboard quickly, rapping Aggie pitcher David Lockett for two runs in the initial inning.

Lockett responded to the treat-ment in stylish fashion striking out the side in the opening frame.
Shortstop Robert Bonner got

The second baseman fielded the ball and threw to the shortstop, forcing Whiddon at second. He then fired the ball to first as Verde was crossing the bag. The first baseman then helplessly held the ball as Thurmond darted home. He slid under the tag and the Farmers jumped in front, 3-2.


