TO BE ELIGIBLE TO PURCHASE THE TEXAS A&M RING, AN UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT MUST HAVE AT LEAST ONE YEAR IN RESIDENCE, CREDIT FOR AT LEAST NINETY-TWO (92) SEMESTER HOURS AND BE IN GOOD STANDING WITH THE UNIVERSITY. A YEAR IN RESIDENCE MAY CONSIST OF THE FALL AND SPRING SEMESTERS OR ONE OF THE ABOVE AND A FULL SUMMER SESSION (BOTH THE FIRST AND SECOND TERMS). THE HOURS PASSED AT THE PRELIMINARY GRADE REPORT PERIOD IN MARCH 1976 MAY BE USED IN SATISFYING THIS NINETY-TWO (92) HOUR REQUIREMENT. STUDENTS QUALIFYING UNDER THIS REGULATION SHOULD LEAVE THEIR NAMES WITH THE RING CLERK, ROOM SEVEN, RICHARD COKE BUILDING. THIS SHOULD BE DONE PRIOR TO MARCH 10TH IN ORDER FOR ALL RECORDS TO BE CHECKED TO DETERMINE RING ELIGIBILITY. STUDENTS ALREADY HAVING NINETY-TWO (92) COMPLETED HOURS ON RECORD AS OF THE FALL SEMESTER 1975 MAY ORDER AT ANY TIME. THESE REGULAR ORDERS ARE MAILED THE LAST WEEK OF EACH MONTH. GRADUATE STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO ORDER WITH PROOF (RECEIPT) THAT THEY HAVE FILED FOR GRADUATION. Psychology department pushes the practical

When Dr. Clessen Martin came to Texas A&M in 1970, the psychology department was nestled in the basement of Bolton Hall. Psychology students spent time sitting around a table drinking coffee and shooting the breeze.

Today, the psychology department at Texas A&M occupies the fourth floor of the Academic building. Nearly 3,000 undergraduate and graduate students are enrolled in psychology courses, and the department is expanding both its facilities and its scope of activities.

Dr. Martin, head of the Psychology Department, said that in the last two years six new faculty members have been hired, and next week a proposal for a doctoral program in applied psychology at A&M will go before the Academic Council.

"We are now at a point where we feel we can offer a doctoral program," Martin said.

To handle the increase in students and faculty, labs are being constructed in the Academic building. Fourteen cubicles are nearly complete which will be used for a wide range of individual or group experiments. An example would be perception research which deals with the reception and processing of the senses — sight, sound and smell.

The department has a completely shielded isolation chamber for similar research. "The reason we have this is because there is a lot of in-

terest these days in biofeedback and monitoring brain activity, heart rate and other physiological functions," Martin said. The shielded room blocks out any type of outside radio waves and electrical activity which would interfere with such research.

"We've really got, in psychology, two major areas of research: animal and human," Martin explained. Human research can range from individual work to group "social psychological" research, such as the study of the effects of competition on problem solving, he said.

"In group research it is important to have rooms where you can get six or eight people in and view their behavior unobtrusively. We do that with one-way mirrors," Martin said. The department has two rooms which are equipped with the mirrors.

In animal research, white rats are traditionally used, due to their ease of care and relative intelligence. Steve Roop, a graduate assistant in psychology, is experimenting with rats as part of his master's thesis. He explained why rats are useful in psychological research: "Animal research is a proving ground for later application to humans. The same basic principles hold true, and basic learning processes are the same whether in a rat, a man or a chimp."

Roop's experiments involve manipulating the reward given to a rat for doing a certain task, in this case running down a straight alley. The speed of the run is measured as an indication of motivation.

"It's not that we are interested in

learning how to motivate rats, there is evidence that it is applicable to human motivation," Roop said.

"No one has ever seen motivation so you have to measure some performance, whether it be grade school, or how fast a rat runs," Martin said. "What I'm interested in is to see Psychology A&M a little different than in other places. Because of the nature of the subject we can be service oriented."

Most psychology departments, Martin said, have tended to be strictly scientific and experimental and have tried to establish psychology as a science.

Martin, however, has been setting up an "experimental psychology concept" in the community. This would give students the opportunity to apply what they know about drug abuse, mental health practices, or alcoholism, he said.

"When a student comes into our program his freshman year I'd like to hit him with the lab, establish scientific basis and get all that under his belt. By the time he is a senior I'd like to have him out getting the mental health and drug treatment centers," Martin said.

"We don't have to convince a body of the scientific aspects of psychology. We have as much offer the people of our culture engineers or agriculturists."

Aggie Plantation:

That's not a farm, boy

A farm by any other name is still a farm. The Texas A&M University Farm is no exception, even though it has more than one name.

Its official name is the Texas A&M University Farm. But say that name

to some of the A&M employees or old-timers in the Brazos Valley, and they'll either correct you or not know what you're talking about. It has been called the A&M Plantation for many years, Dr. Ralph Miller, the

research farm manager said. A unit in Burleson County was called the Brazos Valley Research Farm until 1968 he said, when it was changed to the A&M Farm.

Purchased in the late 1930s, 3800 acre farm was a combined search and commercial facility. In 1968 when the two units were separated and the name was changed. There are two managers: Dr. Miller in charge of the research, and I. Melton is in charge of the commercial aspect of the farm.

Dr. Miller said the farm is used for teaching and research in agriculture and crops are grown for sale.

The commercial area of the farm is approximately 3400 acres. Corn, grain, sorghum and about 400 head of cattle are raised on the farm. The self-sustaining and Melton said must operate at a profit just like a regular farm because it receives state funds. Six students and full-time employees work there.

The 400-acre research area is divided according to the research being done. Departments doing research on the farm include: Wildlife and Fisheries, Agricultural Engineering, Horticulture and Plant Sciences.

Each researcher is responsible for his own acreage, Melton said.

The farm serves as a demonstration farm for farmers in the Brazos Valley area. Also, the grain sorghum raised is sold as feed to the Animal Science department.
