Regulations questioned

Marrieds ask if peers want pets

Surveys to be issued next week will determine how many married students want pets in their apartments. A&M regulations do not allow pets in University-owned housing.

The Married Student Council has prepared a survey which will reach the five University-owned apartments next Tuesday in the weekly news letter sent out by apartments' manager Ken Nicolas.

The five building areas, Southside, College Avenue, Hensel, Old College View, and College View Brick will have their completed surveys picked up from their doors next Thursday, said Judy Stearman, president of the Married Student Council in a recent interview.

Two questions are asked on the survey.
 First, do you believe pets should be allowed in your spe-

cific apartments?, and second, would you be willing to live in an area with pets?

Also, the survey allows space for people to write suggestions concerning pet deposits or any other limitations, Stearman said.

Last year the same survey was conducted by the Married Student Council with encouraging results from the married students, Stearman said.

Last year's 1,306 total responses, represented 65 per cent of the population of the University-owned apartments, Stearman said.

Of the 1,306 responses, 65 per cent voted yes for pets in their specific apartments; and 58 per cent voted yes for a designated area in each complex for pets, Stearman said.

The controversy at this point

is whether to change the University regulation which reads: "With the exception of Seeing Eye dogs and the official University mascot, animals are not permitted in residence halls, University food service areas, or University-owned apartments."

Earlier this semester, the Student Senate passed the recommendation of having "or University-owned apartments" stricken from the regulation, Stearman said.

This recommendation is now being reviewed by the University Regulations Committee.

A decision made now on the pet situation would not take effect until next fall, when the new University Regulations booklet will be available, said Stearman.

If the decision allows pets to live in University-owned

apartments, the Married Student Council has several plans for control of pets, said Stearman.

Methods of control could consist of a deposit, a leash law, vaccination records according to College Station ordinances, weight and size limitations, and designated areas for pets in each complex, Stearman said.

As the situation now stands, many married students have pets, and the chosen few who have been reported and penalized have either moved away or given up the animal, Stearman said.

"This is our main point. If there are a few being reported and penalized, it's not fair for these few when others with pets are out in their yard laughing," Stearman said.

Some of the officers also were convicted of stealing money by peeps and filing false statements.


