

Top newsmen assemble

Top newsmen from throughout the state begin arriving here Thursday afternoon for the 1976 Texas Associated Press Managing Editors (APME) convention, which also is attracting a blue ribbon group of speakers.

Senator John Tower, Congressman Robert Krueger, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives Bill Clayton, Attorney General John Hill and State Comptroller Bob Bullock are all scheduled to participate in the two-day meeting headquartered at the Ramada Inn. Sharing the spotlight will be a

panel representing higher education, including Dr. Philip Hoffman, president of the University of Houston; Dr. Abner McCall, president, Baylor University; Dr. Joe Rushing, chancellor, Tarrant County Junior College District; Dr. Kenneth Ashworth, commissioner, Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, and Dr. Jack K. Williams, president, Texas A&M.

The APME convention, expected to attract about 75 editors and Associated Press representatives, is jointly hosted by The Eagle and

Texas A&M's University News Service. Activities get under way Thursday evening with a reception hosted by The Eagle and featuring a performance by Texas A&M's Singing Cadets.

Dr. Williams will formally welcome the newsmen at 8:30 a.m. Friday and then moderate a panel discussion on problems facing higher education.

Congressman Krueger, from New Braunfels, will speak on "Deregulation of Gas and Oil Prices" at a noon luncheon, with Clayton, Hill and

Bullock joining in a 2 p.m. panel discussion entitled "How to Make Government More Responsive to the People."

Senator Tower will speak at the convention's closing luncheon at Krueger-Dunn Hall, where the newsmen will be treated to a "meal of the future" composed of a variety of foods derived from glandless cottonseed and other oilseed products. The meal will be prepared by Texas A&M's Food Protein Research and Development Center in cooperation with Food Service personnel at Krueger-Dunn.

TO BE ELIGIBLE TO PURCHASE THE TEXAS A&M RING, AN UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT MUST HAVE AT LEAST ONE YEAR IN RESIDENCE, CREDIT FOR AT LEAST NINETY-TWO (92) SEMESTER HOURS AND BE IN GOOD STANDING WITH THE UNIVERSITY. A YEAR IN RESIDENCE MAY CONSIST OF THE FALL AND SPRING SEMESTERS OR ONE OF THE ABOVE AND A FULL SUMMER SESSION (BOTH THE FIRST AND SECOND TERMS). THE HOURS PASSED AT THE PRELIMINARY GRADE REPORT PERIOD IN MARCH 1976 MAY BE USED IN SATISFYING THIS NINETY-TWO (92) HOUR REQUIREMENT. STUDENTS QUALIFYING UNDER THIS REGULATION SHOULD LEAVE THEIR NAMES WITH THE RING CLERK, ROOM SEVEN, RICHARD COKE BUILDING. THIS SHOULD BE DONE PRIOR TO MARCH 10TH IN ORDER FOR ALL RECORDS TO BE CHECKED TO DETERMINE RING ELIGIBILITY. STUDENTS ALREADY HAVING NINETY-TWO (92) COMPLETED HOURS ON RECORD AS OF THE FALL SEMESTER 1975 MAY ORDER AT ANY TIME. THESE REGULAR ORDERS ARE MAILED THE LAST WEEK OF EACH MONTH. GRADUATE STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO ORDER WITH PROOF (RECEIPT THAT THEY HAVE FILED FOR GRADUATION). THE RING CLERK IS ON DUTY FROM 8 A.M. TO 12 NOON AND 1 P.M. TO 5 P.M. OF EACH WEEK, MONDAY THROUGH FRIDAY. HOWEVER, ORDERS FOR RECORDS TO BE CHECKED, ORDERS MUST BE PLACED PRIOR TO 11:30 A.M. AND 4 P.M. WE HOPE THIS INFORMATION WILL BE HELPFUL AND EXTEND OUR CONGRATULATIONS.

Panel recommends study of high-rise parking facility

Construction of a high-rise parking facility on the Texas A&M campus should be studied as a solution to the parking problem according to a recommendation by the University Traffic Panel.

The recommendation, made at yesterday's panel meeting, was a result of a general discussion of possible solutions to the Texas A&M traffic problem. The north end of Spence Park, between Throckmorton and

Streets, was suggested as a location for such a facility. The area 21, behind the Triggs 60 were also listed as possible locations.

Spence Park was the choice because of its location on campus and lack of traffic problems. The panel discussed making the proposed facility a daily situation open to allowing to pay the price to park in a garage.

The state prohibits the use of appropriated funds for the construction of a multi-story parking facility. Funding of this structure would have to come through sources such as the sale of bonds and user fees.

Other action by the panel was to include a motion asking for a planned expansion of parking spaces 56 and 61, across the railroad tracks to be completed as soon as possible. The panel also said there were 500 new parking spaces available with the construction of the baseball field already approved by the TAMU Board of Regents.

The controversy over the boundary between lots seven and eight, between the Reed Melcher building and the Cyclotron, was discussed after a complaint from Suzanne Ness.

"I suspect we goofed here," Robert Melcher, administrator for the vicepresident, student services. "But it wasn't a tentational goof."

Melcher explained that the shifting of boundaries for the lot was done to comply with a panel recommendation made last year. When the lines were drawn in September of last year, two overlooked signs that marked the boundary. The recent change in the lot was merely the correction of this oversight.

Projected revenues from the panel for the next 18 months show the panel has available funds for the construction of about 1000 parking spaces at current costs. Additional day student parking spaces will be made available with the moving of underclass students out of lot 48, east of Field, to lot 40 as those are moved into the new part of lot behind Mosher Hall.
