

# Shortage of flu vaccine expected

WASHINGTON — The drug industry said Wednesday it probably will not make enough vaccine by next year to protect every American against a swine flu virus similar to one that killed 20 million persons worldwide in the 1918-19 epidemic.

But C. Joseph Stetler, president of the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association, also told Congress there is no reason to believe everyone will want to be vaccinated or that the vaccine will be available everywhere.

"At this moment," he told a House health subcommittee, "it is impossible to give assurance that sufficient vaccine to inoculate all Americans — 213 million doses — can be produced by the target date of October or November. The probabilities are that it cannot."

The four U.S. drug companies licensed to make vaccine can produce enough to satisfy needs, however, Stetler said, if remaining scientific issues are resolved and if Congress grants the companies limited immunity from antitrust laws and indemnifies them for liability law suits arising from the vaccine.

Government witnesses have testified that persons who are allergic to eggs should not take the vaccine, but that most other persons should experience no more discomfort than a sore arm for a few days.

## Self-awareness topic of career conference

When you were twelve years old, what was your favorite room in your house?

This was one of the questions asked a 24-member audience at the Women's Career Conference yesterday by Barbara Brightwell.

Brightwell, from the center for creative resources in Houston, was the speaker for the topic of "Decision-Making Through Self-awareness."

Other questions asked by Brightwell were favorite holiday, favorite time of day, and the most desired place in the world to visit.

Two questions were the major topics of discussion at the workshop session yesterday: If someone gave

you \$1 million, how would you spend it to benefit someone? And, if you could ask one question to a higher being, what would it be?

The purpose of discussing the questions openly, she said, was to let the audience look at themselves.

"Everytime you make a change, you go through a grief process, whether it's losing a job or a relationship," Brightwell said.

"The most important part of the grief process is anger. We must find how to get rid of that. But I find the toughest thing is to explain anger to someone," Brightwell said.

She explained transactional analysis to the audience, as a drama in which each person is playing a script.

"It is important to know what your script is," said Brightwell.

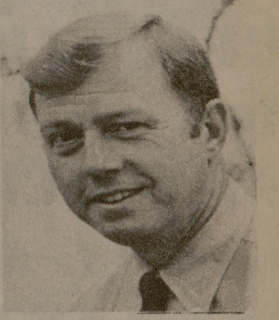

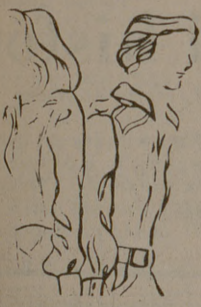
