Texas A&M track coach Charles Thomas will take a seven man squad to Philadelphia, Pa. this weekend as teams from across the country par-ticipate in the National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field meet.

The meet closes out the season for the Aggies who finished third behind Texas and Baylor in the Southwest Conference meet. Although the Aggies will have little hope for the team title, they are almost certain to exceed the two points they scored in last year's nationals meet by Doug

Hurdler Shifton Baker, a junior from Elgin, will compete in both the 120-yard highs and the 440-yard in-termediates. Baker has a best in the highs of 13.8 this year, good for fourth in the SWC and fourth in the United States Track and Field Fed-eration meet held last weekend in Wichita, Kan. He was also fourth in the intermediates behind world record holder Jim Bolding and Olympic hopeful Nolan Cromwell of Kan-sas. Baker has a best of 50.88 in the intermediates, winning him second in the conference.
