A&M Health Center sports new doctor

A sleek silver-gray Porsche Carrera glides to a stop in the parking lot, and a tall, tanned young man hops out of the driver's seat. He strides purposefully toward the door of the University Health Center, where he will spend the day treating Aggies with a myriad of medical complaints.

Dr. James P. Martin, 37 years old, may not carry a little black bag or wear wire-rimmed spectacles, but he is every bit as dedicated to the practice of medicine as Marcus Welby appears to be.

Martin, who began working at the Health Center May 31, after leaving a private practice in Southern California, became the fifth full-time doctor to be added to the Health Center staff.

He hated to leave California's sunny beaches and roaring surf behind, but says that he has always wanted to return to Texas. Martin attended Southwestern Medical School in Dallas.

Martin added that he enjoys working with young people, and gets a kick out of Aggies in particular.

"Aggies are unique. In dealing with them one can sense a feeling of tradition and unity, a sort of collective pride that manifests itself in the friendliness of the students," Martin said.

Martin says that he finds the students very easy to work with, and thinks the job is fun since he's working with a basically healthy population.

The students all seem to be very appreciative. Here at the Health Center we're dealing with intelligent people who care about their health and who respond to treatment.

"The job is really fun, and the ailments are fascinating. I think people get rashes they get nowhere else in the world, and I think they strain muscles they don't strain anywhere else," Martin said.

Martin is a bit amused by College Station, and admits that after living in more cosmopolitan areas he finds the night life somewhat lacking. A native of Tennessee, Martin has had some difficulty adjusting to the oppressive College Station humidity, but has found ways to beat the heat.

Martin says that he has more free time now than he did in private practice, and he spends it camping in his commodious van, water-skiing or swimming.

"I play at tennis," Martin said, laughing. He added that he enjoys flying and has his private pilot's license, but has not yet purchased an airplane in College Station.

Martin's stylish Porsche Carrera may raise some of the Maggie's eyebrows, but he isn't worried.

"I bought the car because I figured when you've worked that hard and that long, even if you don't have anything else, you want to have something you can see to show for it, something you can touch."

Works center opens

A Public Works Resource Center has been established at Texas A&M University to help cities acquire new technology faster.

The center is seen as a means of saving cities costly and time-consuming research and development.

Support for the center, operated as part of the Texas Engineering Extension Service's (EES) recently established Public Works Training Division, has been provided by the American Public Works Association (APWA).

A. Holland Winder, APWA Texas chapter president, presented a \$1,000 gift in support of center activities. The chapter has committed similar amounts over the next two years.

Engineering Dean Fred J. Benson accepted the gift. The presentation ceremony also involved James R. Bradley, EES director; Dr. Charles H. Samson Jr., Civil Engineering Department head; and Milton Radke, EES' Public Works Training Division head.

By serving as a focal point for collection and dissemination of new

public works technology, the Resource Center will provide member municipalities any available material on request.

Materials will come from the research, extension and academic programs of Texas A&M in the public works area. Research activities of the College of Engineering, Texas Engineering Experiment Station, Texas Transportation Institute and EES will be of significance.

The center will serve the public works profession statewide and nationally.

The officials noted that it will allow faculty to work directly with public works professionals to solve problems, aid faculty in defining problem areas and initiating research, and identifying training needs for the EES division.

A&M biology prof. Nevitt dies

Services for Dr. Kem R. Nevitt, Texas A&M University veterinary biology instructor, were held in Fredonia, Kan. Monday.

Nevitt, 47, died Friday night after suffering an asthma attack.

Born March 8, 1929 in Tuscaloosa, Ala., he resided at 3104 Foxwood, Bryan. He had been a member of the faculty since 1975, having come to the College of Veterinary Medicine after 14 years private practice in Fredonia. Nevitt held B.S. and D.V.M. degrees from Kansas State University.

Survivors include his wife, Twyla Nevitt; a daughter, Leslie Nevitt of the home; and a son, James R. Nevitt II, a student at Oklahoma State University.

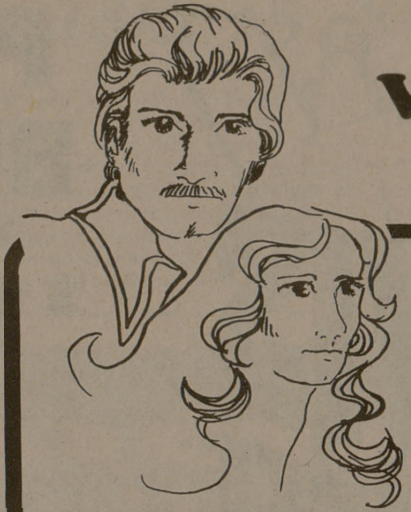
