Business Administration. EDP for three years has conducted fire officials executive development courses for Texas fire officials through the Fire Protection Training Division of theTexas Engineering Extension

A grant was provided by the National Fire Protection and Control Administration of the U.S. Department of Commerce to assemble

Curtis M. Burns, EDP assistant director, said the conference has two basic objectives. It seeks to determine what problems in fire department management can be helped by executive development training and to identify resources, institutional and individual, that can

be brought to bear on the problems.

Among participating officials are nationally known Cincinnati Fire Chief Bert Lugannani; Myrle Wise, president-elect of the International Association of Fire Chiefs and Denver chief; Alan Brunacini, chairman of the 8,000-plus member Fire

Service Section of the National Fire Protection Association and Phoenix chief, and P. E. Adams, Texas Association of Fire Fighters president and El Paso fireman. Fire officials arrived Monday

from Illinios, Oregon, Massachusetts, California, Washington, New York and Oklahoma. They include Houston Chief Joseph Perino.

Sessions at the Rudder Center include presentations on existing executive development programs for fire officials. This part of the pro-

gram includes Burns and speakers from Illinios State University, the University of Illinois, Louisiana State and Southern Methodist.
