AGGIELAND REFUND POLICY
Yearbook fees are refundable in full during the semester in which payment is made. Thereafter no refunds will be made on cancelled orders. Yearbooks must be picked up during the academic year in which they are published.
Students who will not be on campus when the yearbooks are published, usually by September 1, must pay a mailing and handling fee. Yearbooks will not be held, nor will they be mailed without the necessary fees having been paid.
Refunds will not be made on books not picked up within one semester of the publication date (December 17, 1976 for the 1976 AggieLand).
This policy takes effect with the delivery of the 1976 edition of the AggieLand.

TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY OFFICE OF THE DEAN OF ADMISSIONS AND RECORDS

To be eligible to purchase the Texas A&M ring, an undergraduate student must have at least one year in residence, credit for at least ninety-two (92) semester hours and be in good standing with the university. A year in residence may consist of the fall and spring semesters or one of the above and a full summer session (both the first and second terms). The hours passed at the Preliminary Grade Report Period on October 20, 1976 may be used in satisfying this ninety-two hour requirement. Students qualifying under this regulation should leave their names with the ring clerk, Room Seven, Richard Coke Building. This should be done prior to October 20th in order for all records to be checked to determine ring eligibility. This does not apply to students already having ninety-two (92) completed hours on record prior to the fall semester because they may order rings at any time. These orders are mailed during the last week of each month. Graduate students are eligible to order with proof (receipt) that they have filed for graduation.

Orders for mid-semester will be taken by the ring clerk starting October 21st, 1976, and will continue until December 1st, 1976. Students not placing their orders during this mid-semester period may order after final grades are posted and the ninety-two (92) hours are completed. All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Students will save time if they will bring grade reports along when ready to order. Anyone who has failed to leave their name in advance will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked.
All rings ordered at mid-semester regardless of whether on October 21st, 1976 or December 1st, 1976, will be mailed in at the same time and will be due to arrive here at the Registrar's Office on January 31, 1977.
The ring clerk is on duty from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. of each week, Monday through Friday. However, in order for records to be checked, orders must be placed prior to 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.
We hope this information will be helpful and extend our congratulations.



Revaluation raises local property tax

A&M Consolidated School District property owners, dissatisfied with increased property valuations, will be forced to go to court if they want to change the existing tax rolls.

The cause of dissension stems from revaluation of property between Texas Avenue and Wellborn Highway and between Jersey Street and Holleman Drive, resulting in tax rate increases to property owners in this section.

Jewell Ellis, tax assessor-collector said the tax rate increases are running from 30 per cent to as much as 200 per cent.

He blames the rise in prices on inflation. The last time this section was revalued was in 1965.

Ellis said that while a house that sold for \$20,000 in 1965 is now worth \$40,000, it still may be listed on the tax rolls at the 1965 assessed market value. Revaluation is necessary to equalize the market values.

The school district perceives revaluation as a necessity; a number of residents claim it is unfair.

In a letter to the tax assessor's office Sept. 13, 1976, property owner Donald B. McCrory complained the revaluation of his land was inequitable. He added that because property owners cannot vote against tax increases, they have no remedy except through law suits.

School board President William Lancaster said last month that the tax rate has been set and property owners have been reviewed by the Board of Equalization, the board cannot legally change the tax rolls.

School board members approved a tax rate Aug. 16 to finance the 1976-77 budget. At that time there were no recommendations or comments by residents concerning the budget.

At the same meeting, members adopted a tax rate of \$1.34 for maintenance and 47 cents for bonded indebtedness interest, totaling \$1.81 for each \$100 of assessed property value.

The school board agreed to the increased taxes at the September board meeting and dissatisfied property owners were left with the system as their last option.


