probably not as gung-ho on 'pro-tecting' something in the Old Army tradition as in the past when the school was totally militaryoriented.


When participation in a tradition gets to the point where bodily harm results (as it did in this instance with a dislocated shoulder) then it is time to reexamine that tradition.




