AGGIELAND REFUND POLICY

Yearbook fees are refundable in full during the semester in which payment is made. Thereafter no refunds will be made on cancelled orders. Yearbooks must be picked up during the academic year in which they are published.

Students who will not be on campus when the yearbooks are published, usually by September 1, must pay a mailing and handling fee. Yearbooks will not be held, nor will they be mailed without the necessary fees having been paid.

Refunds will not be made on books not picked up within one semester of the publication date (December 17, 1976 for the 1976 Aggieldand).

This policy takes effect with the delivery of the 1976 edition of the Aggieldand.

TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY OFFICE OF THE DEAN OF ADMISSIONS AND RECORDS

To be eligible to purchase the Texas A&M ring, an undergraduate student must have at least one year in residence, credit for at least ninety-two (92) semester hours and be in good standing with the university. A year in residence may consist of the fall and spring semesters or one of the above and a full summer session (both the first and second terms). The hours passed at the Preliminary Grade Report Period on October 20, 1976 may be used in satisfying this ninety-two hour requirement.

Students qualifying under this regulation should leave their names with the ring clerk, Room Seven, Richard Coke Building. This should be done prior to October 20th in order for all records to be checked to determine ring eligibility. This does not apply to students already having ninety-two (92) completed hours on record prior to the fall semester because they may order rings at any time. These orders are mailed during the last week of each month. Graduate students are eligible to order with proof (receipt) that they have filed for graduation.

Orders for mid-semester will be taken by the ring clerk starting October 21st, 1976, and will continue until December 1st, 1976. Students not placing their orders during this mid-semester period may order after final grades are posted and the ninety-two (92) hours are completed.

All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Students will save time if they will bring grade reports along when ready to order. Anyone who has failed to leave their name in advance will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked.

All rings ordered at mid-semester regardless of whether on October 21st, 1976 or December 1st, 1976, will be mailed in at the same time and will be due to arrive here at the Registrar's Office on January 31, 1976. The Registrar's Office will be on duty from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. of each week, Monday through Friday. However, in order for records to be checked, orders must be placed prior to 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

We hope this information will be helpful and extend our congratulations.

Volleyball team wins zone tournament

Texas A&M's forever amazing women's intercollegiate volleyball team has been creating exciting news all season long, and this past weekend was certainly no exception.

At the Zone Tournament in Huntsville the Aggies, putting together perhaps their finest showing in A&M's short history, twice defeated nationally ranked University of Houston in separate matches, as they stormed their way to the Zone Championship.

To fully appreciate this outstanding accomplishment, one must first consider the obstacles that A&M

faced along the way. To begin with, out of the four different zones in Texas, A&M's zone (East zone) is the toughest and strongest in the state. It includes the University of Houston, who has the distinction of being ranked third in the nation, and Lamar University, last year's State champion.

But the biggest obstacle the Aggs faced, without a doubt, came in the 6'5" package of Flo Hyman, the Cougars' star player. She, along with a couple of her U. of H. teammates, competed on the United States Olympic Volleyball team.

Fortunately, however, obstacles

don't seem to bother the Aggies, at least they didn't this past weekend.

U. of H. and A&M came into the six team Zone Tournament seeded first and second, respectively, which enabled them both to receive byes in the first round of competition.

A&M's first match came in the second round against Lamar University. The Ags won easily 15-6, 15-12, thus gaining a berth in the final round of the winner's bracket against U. of H.

This match against U. of H. and the mighty Flo was not so easy. It proved to be a struggle all the way with the Aggies prevailing 15-13,

16-14. Since this was the Cougars' first loss in the double elimination tournament, they still remained in contention for the championship.

The Cougars then defeated Lamar in the losers bracket, giving Lamar a third place finish in the tournament and U. of H. another shot at A&M in the finals.

Beating U. of H. once in a tournament is an incredible accomplishment, but doing it twice is asking the impossible. But apparently, no one told this to the Aggies.

Looking as strong as ever, the Ags convincingly defeated the Cougars 15-9, 15-10 in the final match to cap-

ture the championship title.

Sam Houston State University placed fourth in the tournament while Stephen F. Austin placed fifth and Rice sixth.

The top three teams in each advance to the State Tournament, A&M, U. of H., and Lamar advance to the State Tournament which will be held November 13 in Canyon, Texas.

The top finishers at State will advance to the Regional Tournament the following weekend in Nacogdoches.

If the Aggies keep up their pace at the State and Regional tournaments, Coach Laura Klum believes they will have a chance for national ranking.

For a pre-State warm-up, the Aggies will travel to Arlington, Texas, to compete in the University of Texas at Arlington tournament.

Cross-country team takes first

The Texas A&M cross-country team came away with a first place finish in a Triangular Meet in Waco last Saturday. The schools competing against the Aggies were Baylor and North Texas State University.

A&M finished first with 21 points, Baylor finished second with 23 points and North Texas finished third with 63 points. The team's lowest point total wins the trophy.

One of the more interesting aspects of the contest was the fact that Aggies tied for first place. Lane Mitchell and Lane Mitchell tied for first place in the five mile trek in 24:59. The tie is quite unusual since the usually one strong runner in a country field.

Other top finishers for the Aggies were Walt Jochimowicz, fourth, Manfred Kohls, fifth, Joel Vogt finished eighth, and Class finished twelfth and Phil Lin finished fourteenth.

The next contest for the Aggies is the Southwest Conference Country Meet in Lubbock, Texas, which will be held Nov. 8 and will be a mile event.

Aggie pistol team places second

In Arlington this past weekend, Texas A&M pistol team competed against the University of Texas at the University of Texas at Arlington 35 individuals fired in the competition, with the Aggies placing second in individual competition with a 91.4 per cent average. Hall and Will Hooge tied for seventh.

The Ags are through for the formal competition, with their meet occurring in March. There will be an intra-squad match among Aggies next month.
