OFFICIAL NOTICE
AGGIELAND REFUND POLICY
 Yearbook fees are refundable in full during the semester in which payment is made. Thereafter no refund will be made on canceled orders. Yearbooks must be picked up during the academic year in which they are published.

Students who will not be on campus when the yearbooks are published, usually by September 1, must pay a mailing and handling fee. Yearbooks will not be mailed, nor will they be mailed without the necessary fees having been paid.
 Refunds will not be made on books not picked up within one semester of the publication date (December 17, 1976 for the 1976 Aggieland).

This policy takes effect with the delivery of the 1976 edition of the Aggieland.

TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY
OFFICE OF THE DEAN OF ADMISSIONS AND RECORDS
 To be eligible to purchase the Texas A&M ring, an undergraduate student must have at least one year in residence, credit for at least ninety-two (92) semester hours and be in good standing with the university. A year in residence may consist of the fall and spring semesters or one of the above and a full summer session (both the first and second terms). The hours passed at the Preliminary Grade Report Period on October 20, 1976 may be used in satisfying this ninety-two hour requirement. Students qualifying under this regulation should leave their names with the ring clerk, Room Seven, Richard Coke Building. This should be done prior to October 20th in order for all records to be checked to determine ring eligibility. This does not apply to students already having ninety-two (92) completed hours on record prior to the fall semester because they may order rings at any time. These orders are mailed during the last week of each month. Graduate students are eligible to order with proof (receipt) that they have filed for graduation.

Orders for mid-semester will be taken by the ring clerk starting October 21st, 1976, and will continue until December 1st, 1976. Students not placing their orders during this mid-semester period may order after final grades are posted and the ninety-two (92) hours are completed. All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Students will save time if they will bring grade reports along when ready to order. Anyone who has failed to leave their name in advance will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked. All rings ordered at mid-semester regardless of whether on October 21st, 1976 or December 1st, 1976, will be mailed in at the same time and will be due to arrive here at the Registrar's Office on January 31, 1976. The ring clerk is on duty from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. of each week, Monday through Friday. However, in order for records to be checked, orders must be placed prior to 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

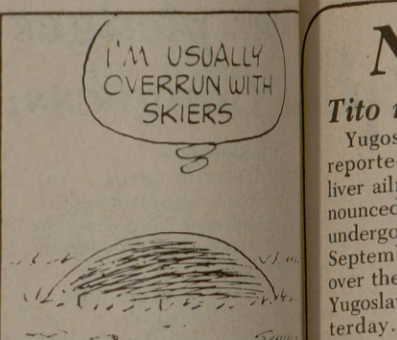

First med class to be 32 strong

Thirty-two medical students will be the first class of the provisionally accredited Texas A&M University medical education program, A&M Dean of Medicine James A. Knight said.

Authority to enroll the students was granted by the American Medical Association of the American Medical Colleges Liaison Committee on Medical Education. The committee's survey team, which visited Texas A&M earlier this year to evaluate the program, recommended the action.

Texas A&M's medical program is being organized in association with Baylor College of Medicine, Scott and White Memorial Hospital and the Veteran's Administration. The VA has awarded A&M grants of \$17,071,609 under provisions of the Veterans Administration Medical School Assistance and Health Manpower Training Act of 1972.



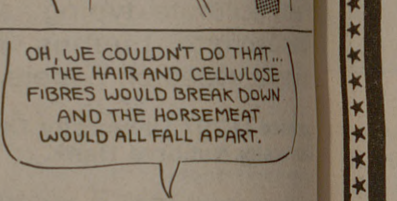
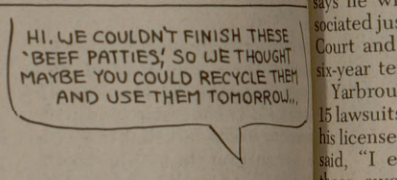
No agreement reached yet in Rhodesian black-rule talks

GENEVA, Switzerland — The Rhodesian conference on black rule settled down to verbal sniping and technical talks today, with no progress toward agreement in sight.
 Prime Minister Ian Smith left for home yesterday after telling a British television interviewer that "some of the rather stupid black politicians" were wasting the conference's time.
 "We've had some stupid puerile behavior from some of the delegates," he said.
 "We don't care what Smith thinks. His presence is not essential," said a spokesman for black leaders Joshua

Nkomo and Robert Mugabe.
 Nkomo and Mugabe contend that Britain, despite the Rhodesian whites' successful declaration of independence 11 years ago, should take the government away from them and hand it over to the blacks.
 Foreign Minister Pieter van der Byl, left in charge of Smith's delegation, said no progress can be made until the four black factions stop "squabbling" with the whites and each other.
 Van der Byl was scheduled to meet black leaders today for technical talks.
 In an effort to keep the talks going,

British conference chairman Ivor Richard proposed the delegations skip such substantive issues as when black rule would be established and discuss instead the technicalities involved in transferring power from the 278,000 whites to the 6.4 million blacks.
 "I am leaving because nothing is taking place," Smith said in the television interview. "It is procrastination and people are walking around the problem instead of getting to grips with the problem."
 He also said suggestions that Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger should be asked to take part in the conference were premature.
