

Coogs ready to pick cotton

HOUSTON — Houston Coach Bill Yeoman said Tuesday he doesn't expect any lag in concentration from his seventh ranked Cougars this week against Rice to compare with last week's fourth quarter lag in a 27-19 victory over Texas Tech.

All the Cougars need to wrap up the Southwest Conference championship in their first year to compete, is to defeat cross-town rival Rice in their final SWC game Saturday.

Yeoman says the Cougars will be ready. "They know what's involved and they know what's at stake," Yeoman said.

"I don't think there's any doubt that we'll play with great concentration."

The Cougars, 7-2 for the season, had great first half concentration last week when they jumped off to a 24-5 halftime lead over ninth ranked Tech. The Raiders got the momentum and scored two fourth quarter touchdowns.

It wasn't until the final three minutes when freshman safety Elvis Bradley intercepted a pass deep in UH territory, that Yeoman could breathe easier.

"I closed my eyes the final three minutes of the game," Yeoman said. "We've got to learn to finish what we

start. I think our concentration left in the fourth quarter. They were trying real hard but not concentrating."

The Owls will get into Saturday's game against the Cougars with little to cheer about other than quarter-

back Tommy Kramer, the nation's leading passer. But Yeoman figures that's plenty of a problem.

"Kramer is a fine quarterback," Yeoman said. "There's no doubt what they'll be doing Saturday."

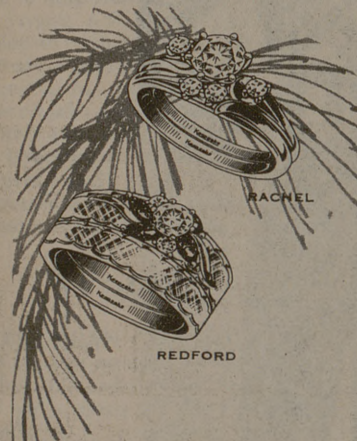

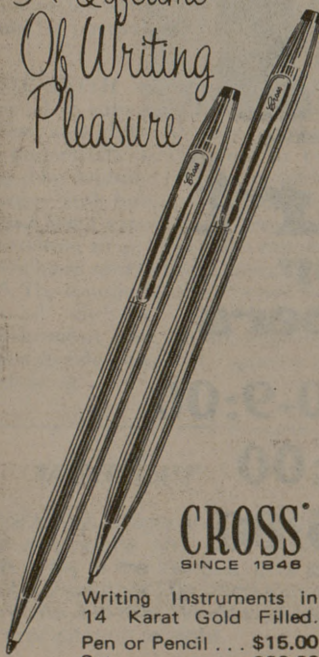
