

Business job seekers should attend seminar

The College of Business Student Council will end its first career seminar tonight in Texas A&M University's Student Center. Today's program will begin at 7 p.m. and will include talks on job placement and training programs by representatives of twelve state and national firms. The program will be aimed at students in management, finance, accounting and marketing.

Council members began plans in October for the two-day seminar according to council member Stuart Kingsbery.

The idea was to fill the information gaps between student and employer in a wide variety of business fields, "junior accounting major Kingsbery said.

"It seems the A&M job placement office is one of the best-kept secrets on campus," he said, "and

this hopefully annual event will give valuable information to business pregraduates."

Joe Silva of the Dale Carnegie Institute began the 21-speaker seminar yesterday afternoon with a talk on human relations and stressed criticism as one of the roadblocks in business careers.

The next introductory speaker, Louis VanPelt of the Placement Office, spoke of that office's services as a "must" for job seekers and said, "Not enough students even know where the placement office is."

The balance of yesterday evening's program included talks by eight Texas businessmen from various industries.

Students find Carter fairer

United Press International LUBBOCK — A National Student Lobby spokesman says he feels youth problems will get a fairer hearing from President Carter than former President Ford because of what he described as Ford's "Cold War mentality."

"We view him (Carter) as a definite improvement over President Ford," said David Rosen, legislative director of the NSL.

"There was really a Cold War

mentality between the Ford Administration and the students, given the vetoes of budget appropriations for student aid over the last two years.

"We don't expect the veto fights in the Carter Administration, although we are keeping an open and skeptical mind to it. We do not yet know his commitment to full funding basic grant programs. That's one thing we're pushing very hard on this spring."

About 50 students from univer-

sities across the United States were at Texas Tech Friday discussing state and national legislation affecting campuses with representatives of the federal Office of Education.

The NSL met in November with President Carter and "at that time he said he advocated a massive intern program to bring students to Washington," Rosen said.

asked for change for a \$5 bill.

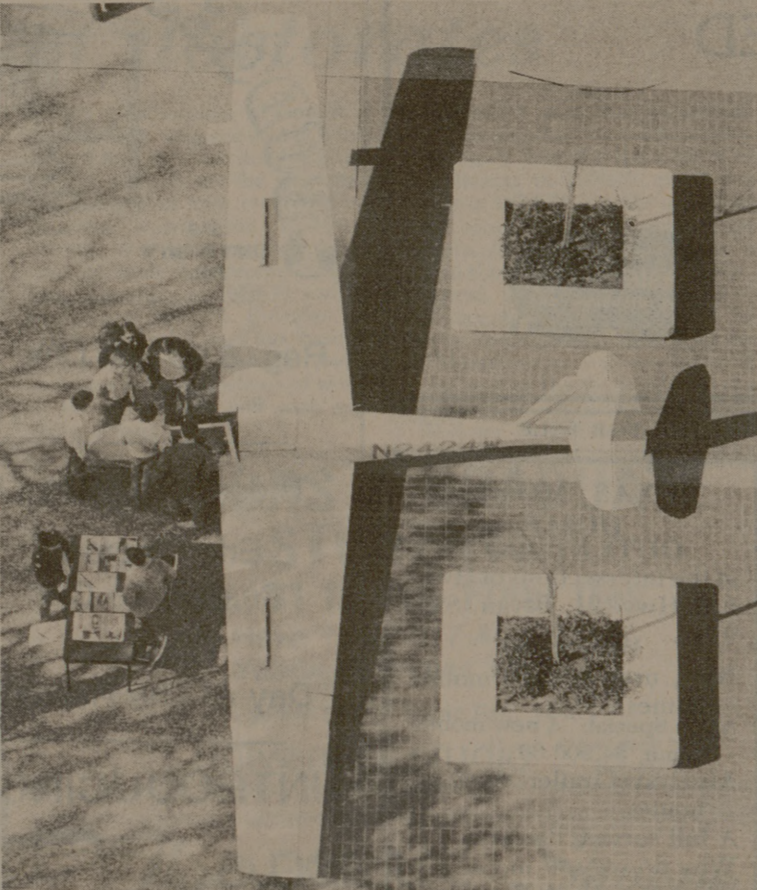

HEW to review Medicaid money paid to doctors

New Orleans (UPI) — A team from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare will arrive in Louisiana January 31 to conduct a two week review of Medicaid payments to doctors to determine if any are being made improperly.

The study, and a similar study of prescription payments already under way, was disclosed Wednesday by Roy Westerfield, head of the state Office of Family Services.

Westerfield said HEW investigators began working yesterday on a sample study of welfare prescriptions, which they will trace to the source for violations. The team from the federal Medical Services Agency will check for violations which have been reported in doctor's Medicaid payments, he said.

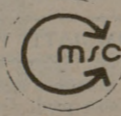
