## Parsons Mounted Cavalry to ride in parade and show

Texas A&M University's Parsons Mounted Cavalry saddles up Friday for its first outing of a busy spring semester.

The troop will represent the University in three livestock shows and San Antonio's "Battle of Flowers." On April 3 the cavalry sponsors its annual spring horse show.

The all-senior special unit of the Corps of Cadets rides first this weekend in the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth. Led by commander Joe Heifer of Sweetwater, the 30-member troop is booked in the parade and show.

Parsons Mounted Cavalry will truck horses and gear to the San Antonio Livestock Exposition for a parade appearance and a precision drill on Feb. 11.

Two weeks later, the cavalrymen mount up for the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo parade.

The organization returns to San Antonio for the "Battle of Flowers" parade April 22, said Jeff Shannon, troop executive officer of Wayside. Also serving in unit leadership posts are First Sergeant Rich Lane of Richmond and Platoon Leaders Tad Rielly of Dawsonville, Md., and Leo Casas of San Diego.

In its fourth year, the show piece organization that rode in several Corps march-ins to football games last fall is named in honor of Col. Thomas R. Parsons. The commandant helped get the troop organized and equipped. Members supply their own horses, which are stabled on three acres at the Research and Extension Center at Bryan.

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
