In order to qualify as a candidate for a degree in the College of Science, each student must demonstrate an ability to express himself (or herself) in acceptable English. This requirement may be satisfied by (1) passing an examination in English composition (EPE) taken not later than the spring semester of the junior year, or (2) completing English 301 with a minimum grade of C.

Any student who fails the written examination (EPE) must satisfy the English proficiency requirement by taking English 301 and earning a minimum grade of C.

SENIOR RING ORDERING PROCEDURE

OFFICE OF THE DEAN OF ADMISSIONS AND RECORDS
 To be eligible to order the Texas A&M ring, an undergraduate student must have at least one year in residence, credit for at least ninety-two (92) semester hours and be in good standing with the University. A year in residence may consist of the Fall and Spring semesters or one of the above and a full summer session (both the first and second terms). The hours passed at the preliminary grade report period on March 23rd may be used in satisfying this ninety-two hour requirement. Students qualifying under this regulation should leave their names with the ring clerk, Room 307, Richard Coke Building. This should be done prior to March 23rd in order for all records to be checked to determine ring eligibility. (Any student having completed ninety-two (92) hours at the end of the Fall '76 semester may order at any time. There is never a dead-line once the hours have been completed, with the exception of a monthly mailing date.) Graduate students are eligible to order with proof (receipt) that they have filed for graduation. Orders for mid-semester will be taken by the ring clerk starting March 23, 1977, and will continue until April 26, 1977. Students who do not place their order during this period may order after final grades are posted. All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Please bring mid-semester grade reports along when ready to order. Anyone having failed to leave their names in advance and fail to bring grade report will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked. The rings should arrive at the Registrar's Office on June 28, 1977. All rings ordered, regardless of whether on March 23rd or April 26th will arrive at the same time.

The ring clerk is on duty from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. of each week, Monday through Friday. However, in order for records to be checked, orders must be placed prior to 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. We hope this information will be helpful and extend our congratulations.



Expenses and apathy close Brazos Valley Art Gallery

Local artists are not adequately supported by the community, said Nancy Crouch, president of the Brazos Valley Art Gallery.
 The Brazos Valley Art Gallery at 3211A Texas Ave., which is supported by the League, will have closed permanently March 28, it is close because the League is no longer able to pay the bills, Crouch said.
 "The community is either unaware we exist, or not interested in giving us the support we need," she said.
 The League, a non-profit organization, competes with commercial businesses that sell mass-produced art, Crouch said. "People are willing to pay \$150 for an original painting—which only covers the expense for the materials and frame," she said. The artists do not paint for the League.
 "Another problem is that we are treated like a business—which are not," Crouch said. She explained that although the group is a profit organization, they have the same rent, advertising bills, etc., as businesses.
 The League is a group of artists working to encourage art awards in the community. The League membership fluctuates between 100 to 130 members, Crouch said.
 The League holds monthly meetings and schedules special programs which are open to the public. Special programs have been demonstrations on spinning and weaving water color, a program presented Ornamental Castings of Bryan, and other art-oriented programs.
 The League provides exhibits at Bryan Public Library and Bryan Hospital.
