SENIOR RING ORDERING PROCEDURE OFFICE OF THE DEAN OF ADMISSIONS AND RECORDS

To be eligible to order the Texas A&M ring, an undergraduate student must have at least one year in residence, credit for at least ninety-two (92) semester hours and be in good standing with the University. A year in residence may consist of the Fall and Spring semesters or one of the above and a fall summer session (both the first and second terms). The hours passed at the preliminary grade report period on March 23rd may be used in satisfying this ninety-two hour requirement. Students qualifying under this regulation should leave their names with the ring clerk, Room Seven, Richard Coke Building. This should be done prior to March 23rd in order for all records to be checked to determine ring eligibility. (Any student having completed ninety-two (92) hours at the end of the Fall '76 semester may order at any time. There is never a dead-line once the hours have been completed, with the exception of a monthly mailing date.) Graduate students are eligible to order with proof (receipt) that they have filed for graduation. Orders for mid-semester will be taken by the ring clerk starting March 23, 1977, and will continue until April 26, 1977. Students who do not place their order during this period may order after final grades are posted. All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Please bring mid-semester grade reports along when ready to order. Anyone having failed to leave their name on time and fail to bring grade report will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked. The rings should arrive at the Registrar's Office on June 28, 1977. All rings ordered, regardless of when ordered, will be shipped and delivered by mail to arrive at the same time. The ring clerk is on duty from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. of each week, Monday through Friday. However, in order for records to be checked, orders must be placed prior to 1:30 p.m. and 4 p.m. We hope this information will be helpful and extend our congratulations.

Street mime began at age 12

Silent films act as teacher

Even though he belongs to the L.A. Mime Company, Michel Young Evans considers himself a street mime.

Evans explained that in his job he works from the audience's reactions. "You work off of the people. Something new always happens," he said.

Evans told about the time he was doing a scene that involved an evil character who lit up a joint and offered it to different members of the audience. Usually the character turned into a police officer.

Evans said one time a lady walked close to him and looked at him with interest. He offered her the imaginary joint.

"When I did she pulled a wallet out of her bag and showed me her police badge," he said. "She was a

plainclothes cop," Evans said laughing.

"I put out my wrists and she handcuffed me and took me to jail," he said. "She played right along."

Evans started miming at the age of 12.

"I started doing a mechanical man for my own entertainment," he said. "I saw a lady do it on Candid Camera."

"I didn't know it was mime," he said.

Evans said he found out that he was good at pantomiming while taking a college class. "I learned everything my teacher could teach me in four weeks," he said.

By the end of the class, Evans had written and directed his own show. A local theater invited him to do it there.

"The show was well received," he said.

Evans is still learning. "You need to go to Europe to study, or get someone who has studied there to teach you like I am doing," he said.

"I study silent films," Evans said. "Red Skelton, and other silent clowns were the real masters of the silent films. They didn't use the title cards. They told the story with their body," Evans said.

"I am still learning from those films. I watch at least one silent film a week," he said.

Evans, now 26, grew up in the San Fernando valley of California. He is average height, slim build, has short dark hair and is near-sighted.

The glasses he wears on stage are not his real ones; these have no lenses.

"They belong to a character I am starting to build," he said.

"The character has no name yet, but he will."

"He is an extension of myself. He is an extension of my flaws, of everybody's human faults," Evans explained.

"He has a little bit of Bugs Bunny

and Daffy Duck in him. A ball," he said.

Evans does not usually wear "whiteface" that is commonly associated with mime.

"That idea is a misconception," said. "Some mimes wear whiteface just because Marcel Marceau does."

"A mime is not just a whiteface. A mime is a person telling a story through his body, without words," Evans said.

"It is not a whiteface," he

peated.

Evans said that he does wear whiteface when he does his mimes to help him stand out.

Texas A&M University was last stop for Evans on his Texas tour. He is leaving for Los Angeles to continue rehearsing with the

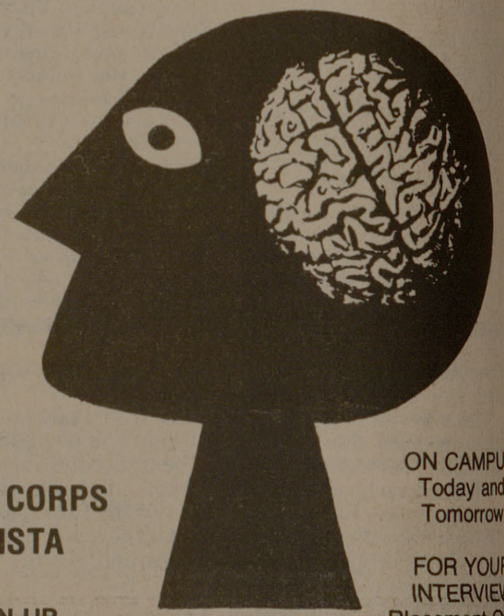
Company. The Company is going to be filmed for four episodes of Donalson's New Rock Concert. This episode will be filmed April 6 and will feature the Average White Band.
