What do you feel to be the top priorities of the office of Student

Body President? The Student Body President must insure the effective functioning of the executive branch of Student Government and this should be his primary consideration. Work-

ing with the Vice Presidents and appointed members of the executive committee, it is his responsibility to see that all legislation passed by the Senate is enacted. A second priority should be student input into Student Government, effected either through their elected representatives or through personal involvement with the many committees of the executive branch. This requires that students are made aware of what Student Government is doing at all times.

What are your qualifications? I have been active in Student Government as a representative of the College of Engineering for the past two years. I have also served as Director of City Relations and as an active member of the External Affairs Committee. 
