Approved by Texas A&M University President Jack K. Williams Feb. 26, bulletin board advertising notice, or roommate-needed and publicity regulations have been extended to include academic buildings and service buildings.

Previously the guidelines applied to bulletin boards, kiosks or other

public areas of the University including residence halls, the Memorial Student Center, Rudder Tower and kiosks on Military Walk.

"This change broadens out publicity regulations to include every building on campus," said Dr. John J. Koldus, vice president for student

Another change in the advertising and publicity guidelines is the departmental units' ability to impose additional advertising restrictions where that academic department is responsible for specific bulletin
