SENIOR RING ORDERING PROCEDURE OFFICE OF THE DEAN OF ADMISSIONS AND RECORDS

To be eligible to order the Texas A&M ring, an undergraduate student must have at least one year in residence, credit for at least ninety-two (92) semester hours and be in good standing with the University. A year in residence may consist of the Fall and Spring semesters or one of either semester and a summer session (both the first and second terms). The hours passed at the preliminary grade report period on March 23rd may be used in satisfying this ninety-two hour requirement. Students qualifying under this regulation should leave their names with the ring clerk, Room Seven, Richard Coke Building. This should be done prior to March 23rd in order for all records to be checked to determine ring eligibility. (Any student having completed ninety-two (92) hours at the end of the Fall '76 semester may order at any time. There is never a deadline once the hours have been completed, with the exception of a monthly mailing date.) Graduate students are eligible to order with proof (receipt) that they have filed for graduation. Orders for mid-semester will be taken by the ring clerk starting March 23, 1977, and will continue until April 26, 1977. Students who do not place their order during this period may order after final grades are posted. All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Please bring mid-semester grade report along when ready to order. Anyone having failed to leave their names in advance and fail to bring grade report will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked. The rings should arrive at the Registrar's Office on or before March 23rd or April 26th will arrive at the same time. The ring clerk is on duty from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. of each week, Monday through Friday. However, in order for records to be checked, orders must be placed prior to 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. We hope this information will be helpful and extend our congratulations. Edwin H. Survivor of Titanic remembers tragedy

LOS ANGELES — Sixty-five years ago today the "unsinkable" Titanic went down in the icy Atlantic, but Edwina "Winnie" MacKenzie can remember almost every minute of what happened in those last hours. At 92, MacKenzie is the oldest survivor of the Titanic. She lives alone in a small house in Hermosa Beach within sight of the Pacific Ocean. She is a peppy lady who still drives a car, has outlasted three husbands and has sailed the Atlantic 10 times since the 1912 tragedy.

There were only 790 persons saved of the 2,307 aboard the liner on its maiden voyage from Southampton, England, to New York. Almost all the survivors were women and children and MacKenzie herself saved someone's infant in her arms as lifeboat No. 13 pulled away from the sinking ship.

Then she was Miss Edwina Troutt, a saucy blonde from Bath, England. "I tell people that a Troutt can't drown," she chuckled. "I told my story at a school and one boy came right back and said a trout can't live in salt water either."

But let Winnie tell her story: "I was booked to sail on the Oceanic and my family and friends were worried because it was sailing on the 13th. Then my Dad got a letter from the White Star line changing my reservation to the Titanic which sailed on the 11th."

"I shared a stateroom with an Irish woman named Miss Keene. She came aboard at Cobh and from the moment I met her she kept moaning that the ship would never make it to New York, that we were doomed. She drove me a little batty. Turned out she was right."

"She and I were at the same dinner table with four men and a young boy. The boy was from Buenos Aires. His parents had sent him to England to school. He didn't like it and was running away to join a brother in New Jersey. There was also a very nice gentleman from Denmark named Mr. MacKenzie. He had sailed suddenly and he did not know he was aboard."

Mrs. MacKenzie was alone when she reached New York on the ship Carpathia, but the ship and the boy perished. "The night of the 14th I had to bed early, but I was awoken at 11:40 p.m. when the engines stopped. I put on my heavy coat and shoes and ran into the passageway. I met a steward and asked what was going on. He pointed to the water and told me that if anything happened they would be looking for me."

"I went into the saloon and there were some men there playing cards and one of them said, 'What's the matter with you? You'll die, what's the matter with you? One of them said the Titanic was grazed an iceberg and they were playing.' MacKenzie started back to her cabin, but came across a man who told her to put on her coat and leave everything behind and get on the boat deck. She and Keene and went topside with toothbrush and a prayer book. "I was surprised to see most all the boats had been ordered. There was an old man, learned later it was Miss Isidore Strauss. There was a woman there with a baby that was jumped into the lifeboat and lowered the baby to me."

"There were a few men on the boat and they pulled away from the light in the distance. The Titanic went down and this scream of death, worse than a siren. A mate told us to step to drown out the sound and that sound still haunts my dreams."

"They reached the Carpathia shortly after dawn. MacKenzie never saw the baby again. She shakes her head at the reputation as unsinkable. "With God all things are possible," she says. "They are going to build a boat that is able."
