Francis' Hall of Achievement
honors A&M statue
 The bust of veterinarian Dr. Francis, which normally
 stands in the entrance to the College
 Veterinary Medicine at Texas
 A&M University, has been loaned
 to the Texas Tech University
 health office's Food and Fiber Hall of
 Achievement.
 The bust has been installed to
 draw attention to the contributions
 made by Francis to the American beef-
 cattle industry.
 Dr. A. Victor Francis, dean of veterinary
 medicine at A&M from 1916 until
 his death in 1936, is one of only two
 men honored by the Food and
 Fiber Hall of Achievement. The
 other is Eli Whitney.
 Texas A&M College of Veterinary
 Medicine officials said the statuette
 will be returned late this year.
 Francis is credited with eliminat-
 ing Texas tick fever through inocula-
 tion programs.
 Texas A&M System Regent Mrs.
 Wilmer Smith attended ceremonies
 installing the figure of Francis at
 Lubbock.
