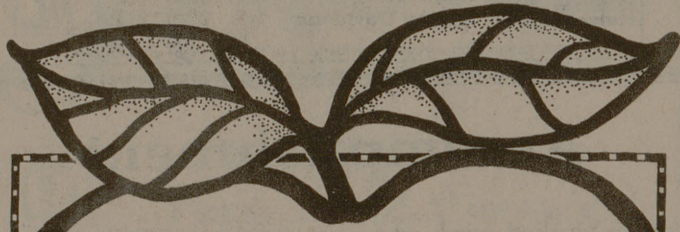

Massachusetts' authorities cite 'chastity' law

Illegal sale of condoms charged 2 store

 BEVERLY, Mass. — Citing a century-old state "chastity" law, authorities have charged branch stores of two major discount drug chains with displaying condoms and selling them without prescriptions.
 Representatives of the Consumer Value Store and the Big L discount store in the wealthy North Shore suburban community of Beverly were ordered to appear in District Court to answer the charges.
 The stores were cited yesterday with violating Massachusetts' Crimes Against Chastity Law, enacted in 1879. The law bars the display or sale of birth control devices without prescriptions.
 "There should be some discretion where condoms are displayed," Essex County Special Assistant District Attorney Paul Cunney said.
 But Sam Clark, a member of the executive committee of Zero Population Growth in Massachusetts, labeled the action "ludicrous."

"It is clearly just a reapplication of a really archaic law that has no bearing on current practice," Clark said.
 Clark said at least 60 per cent of the drugstores in the state openly display birth control devices and sell them without a prescription.
 Meanwhile, birth control advocate William Baird said he would enter the Big L today with a cardboard display of birth control devices and challenge police to arrest him.

Baird spent three months in jail 10 years ago for showing a display of birth control pills to a crowd of 2,000 persons at Boston University. The U.S. Supreme Court later overturned the conviction.
 "I promise if they do arrest me that I will sue the Police Department and every public official connected with this for all they are worth," he said.
 "I don't understand the whole thing myself," added Denise

Kamholz, manager of the Consumer Value Store at the North Shore Shopping Plaza. "I've also had customers come in the store and me it's ridiculous."
 Ms. Kamholz and her husband, Knopf, assistant manager of the store, both said all birth control sales were halted after police inspected the stores last Friday. Displays were also taken down, she said.

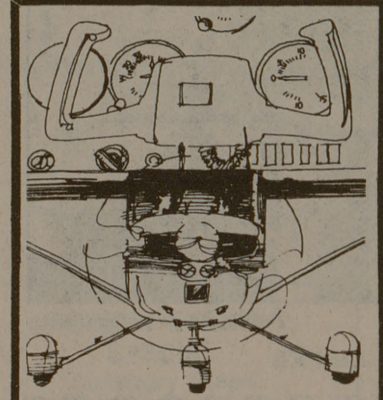

NBC poll shows drop in Carter's popularity

 NEW YORK — Several weeks before President Carter introduced his energy program, he predicted the package would result in a 10 to 15 per cent loss in popularity. According to an NBC poll released yesterday he wasn't too far off the mark.
 The poll, taken after he outlined his stringent energy program, indicated the number of Americans

who believed Carter "was doing excellent or good job overall" had dropped to 53 per cent in April — a 12 per cent loss over the 63 per cent in March.
 The poll also showed 49 per cent of the 1,597 adults interviewed in Congress should approve President Carter's energy program, 32 per cent disagreed and 19 per cent were not sure.
 Of those polled, 11 per cent said Carter was doing an excellent job, 42 per cent said he was doing a good job, 31 per cent rated his performance as fair, 8 per cent considered him poor and another 8 per cent were not sure.
