

Yarbrough voluntarily appears before grand jury for questioning

AUSTIN — Texas Supreme Court Justice Donald B. Yarbrough voluntarily appeared for questioning yesterday before a Travis County grand jury investigating forgery allegations against him.

"I think they're ridiculous," Yarbrough told reporters who asked him for comment on the allegations. Yarbrough, 35, arrived at the courthouse at 2:24 p.m. He was not accompanied by his attorney. Prosecutors had indicated earlier that

the grand jury had invited Yarbrough to appear at 2:30 p.m. He had to knock on a locked door and stand for a minute before being admitted.

Prosecutors sneaked key witness John William Rothkopf, 58, against Yarbrough past reporters and into the Travis County grand jury room to secure secrecy of the testimony. Accompanied by armed investigators from the district attorney's office, the former Yarbrough business associate arrived nearly two hours before the grand jury session and entered by a side door.

Rothkopf, according to a copyrighted article in the Houston Post, has told authorities Yarbrough forged title papers on a 1974 automobile in an Austin motel room May 16.

Rothkopf also, according to the newspaper, contends Yarbrough approached him about finding a hit man to murder a key witness before the Harris County grand jury considering forgery allegations against Yarbrough.

Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle told reporters, "I promised Carol Vance that there'd be no pictures taken of Mr. Rothkopf. It is my understanding he is under protection of the Harris County district attorney's office."

Although Rothkopf was shielded from reporters, a sheriff's deputy was admitted to the locked grand jury office to serve Rothkopf with a subpoena to appear for questioning July 12 in connection with disbarment proceedings against Yarbrough.

Reduction of troopers won't hinder search

LOCUST GROVE, Okla. — The number of State Highway Patrol troopers searching for the slayer of three Girl Scouts was cut by 70 per cent yesterday, but a patrol spokesman denied the reduction was a sign the investigation was winding down.

Lt. Kenneth Van Hoy said the 35 troopers were needed for other duties, particularly during the July 4 weekend.

The troopers, local police, FBI agents and civilian volunteers are seeking Gene Leroy Hart, 33, a convicted rapist who has eluded lawmen for four years since breaking out of the Mayes County Jail at Pryor.

Hart, described as an expert woodsman, has been charged with three counts of first-degree murder in connection with the June 13

deaths of scouts Lori Lee Farmer, 8, Michelle Guse, 9, and Doris Denise Milner, 10.

The search has spanned the densely wooded area around Locust Grove and Camp Scott since Thursday when a farmer saw a man believed to be Hart sprint from a cave along a limestone ridge. Investigators later searched the cave and found remnants of a small fire and food containers.

Although nobody has seen Hart or seen any indication that the suspect is still in the area, the investigation — if not the massive search — is continuing. Van Hoy said additional FBI agents have been brought into the area.

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Anti-Monopoly

Two similar to game
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U.S. District Court Judge Spencer Williams has ruled that the trademark held by the Parker Brothers division of the General Mills Fun Group, Inc., covers "Anti-Monopoly" and any other confusingly similar words in connection with the sale of board games.

Ralph Anspach, a San Francisco State University economics professor, began marketing "Anti-Monopoly" in 1973 and sold about 419,000 sets.

Anspach charged that Parker Brothers obtained the trademark by fraud. He claimed Charles Darrow, from whom the company originally purchased the rights, had copied the game from someone else.

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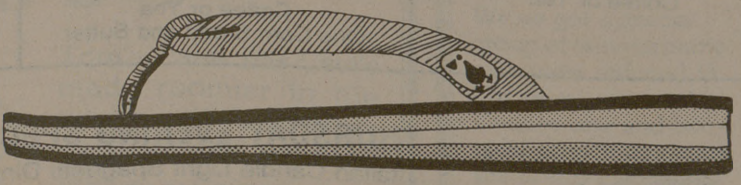
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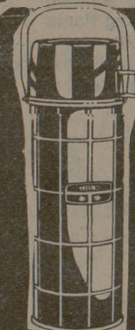
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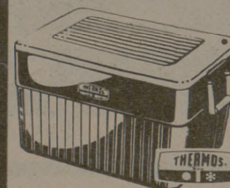
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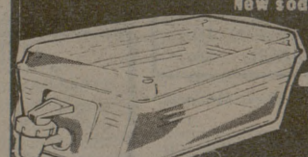
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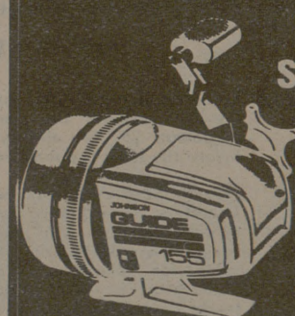
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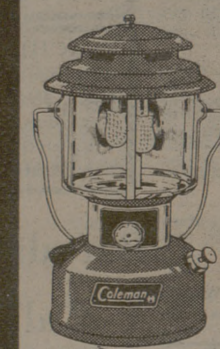
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
