

Yale chemist joins staff studies anti-cancer drui

Texas A&M University has attracted to its campus from Yale one of the world's premier organic chemists and with him as much as a quarter million dollars for research on anti-cancer drug production, vitamin B-12, antibiotics, and

natural, therapeutic drugs.

Dr. Ian Scott joins the Texas A&M faculty as Distinguished Professor of Chemistry. He specializes in the structure and properties of chemicals derived from natural

He is the second chemistry professor of world renown to come to Texas A&M in recent years. Three years ago, Dr. F. Albert Cotton, whose inorganic chemistry studies place him among the world's 10 most-cited authors in science, moved here from Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Modern medical researchers are looking increasingly to the plant world for new drugs. In this field, Dr. Scott's three-volume "Hand-book of Natural Products" is a required reference source around the

Among other projects he will carry on here, Scott is studying several substances which have proved valuable as anti-tumor agents.

'The National Cancer Institute screening program for anti-tumor natural products derived from higher plants has brought to light a number of compounds of great interest in cancer chemotherapy, Dr. Scott pointed out. "Some these drugs come from such plants as the pink periwinkle, the Japanese Yew tree and the Colubrina, which

However, most of the materials occur in low yields and the plant sources can be geographically, bo-tanically and, in the case of Ethiopian and some Central African species, politically inaccessible as a field crop for cultivation in the U.S.," he added. 'The thrust of part of our work is
