Cosmic rays study being conducted

Research on cosmic rays will be conducted by Texas A&M scientists in a salt mine near Hockley. Cosmic rays are atomic particles that move through the solar system undisturbed.
A 50-square-meter array of specially-designed Geiger counters is being assembled to detect the very high energy radiation.
Texas A&M scientists Nelson Duller, Philip Green and Laura Bergamasco Osborne plan the experiment in space provided by the United Salt Corp.

By placing detectors 1,500 meters deep in the mine, the Texas A&M team will have particles below a desired energy level blocked out by the overburden of soil, rock and salt.
The experimental objective is to look for anisotropies in very high energy cosmic ray flux," Dr. Duller said. Cosmic ray anisotropies — different intensities from differing directions — are believed to be caused by large scale magnetic fluctuations and lack of homogeneity in the galaxy.
Little is known of the source of cosmic rays, one of the most energetic phenomena outside of stars detected by man. Cosmic ray particles constantly rain on and into the earth's atmosphere. By-products of their interaction with atoms high in the earth's atmosphere penetrate deep into the earth. Such particles pass through an area the size of a person's head twice per second.
Indications from earlier smaller-array studies show the charged particles to vary in relation to gross magnetic features of the galaxy. From long-time-span "mapping" with the salt mine equipment, the Texas A&M group expects to detect granular characteristics of the cosmic ray flux and to quantify the variation.
Galactic features that deflect the charged particles "may be magnetic field irregularities of the spiral of the galaxy, or enormous magnetic clouds that do not vary appreciably in a human lifetime."
"The experiment will run several years of data collection. We're not expecting many particles per day," Duller said.
"The variation will be small," he explained. "Less than one per cent. We would be starting to detect a one per cent flux variation. The particles consist primarily of protons, one of the atomic building blocks. Cosmic ray particles include 10 to 15 per cent alpha particles, another form of radiation, less than one per cent atomic nuclei of various heavier elements.
The experiment is designed to detect a particle as it passes through one of the Geiger tubes in the array. The scientists are considering using the tubes from disassembled fluorescent light tubes. The ionization gas flows through the tubes, generating an electrical pulse electronically sensed, counted and telemetered to College Station two-meter radio.
Arrangement of detectors will give the scientists three 15-degree views, from above the equator to 60 degrees north of equator. Because the plane of the galaxy angles across the celestial equator, rotation of the earth cause the array to sweep over covering various parts of the galactic plane.
By varying the depth of the detectors, the A&M group could "look" at circles of different energies. Dr. Osborne indicated that particles entering the Hockley mine equipment greater than 300 billion electron volts. Machines used in astrophysics studies accelerate particles up to 200 billion electron volts.
Considering the size of the earth and its depth, Osborne said the experiment should detect three billion particles per year.
The mine environment is ideal for the experiment. Most is quickly absorbed by the salt. Very dry stays around 90 to 100 degrees Fahrenheit. There are no fumes, since everything is electrically powered," Duller said.
