Violence erupts in bus protest

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — A black girl was injured by a thrown brick, some passing cars were damaged and several motorists harassed last night in the biggest anti-busing demonstration here in several months.

However, some 100 riot equipped Jefferson County Police stopped short of using tear gas to disperse unruly demonstrators.

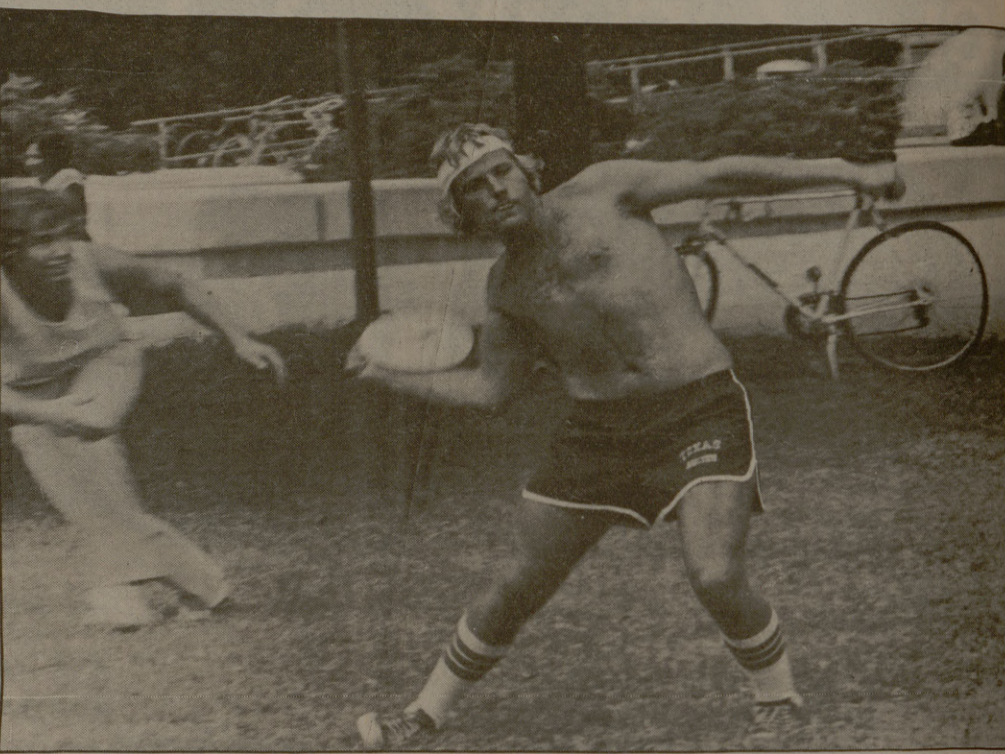
About 75 rowdy demonstrators remained behind after an estimated 400 persons participated in a protest march, marking the second anniversary of riots that erupted Sept. 5, 1975.

"I thought for a few minutes we were going to have to use gas to get some of them to leave after the march," said Police Chief Russell McDaniel.

He said Jacqueline Bedford, 9, suffered a bruised forehead when someone threw a brick at the car in which she was riding with her family as they passed the march. Authorities at a local hospital said the child was not seriously hurt.

The chief said four persons in another passing car, identified as whites, complained to police that some demonstrators started a fistfight with them, but no arrests were made. At least two other cars were reported damaged.

In the Sept. 5, 1975, riots, which began near Valley High School and spread to other blue-collar suburbs, 192 persons were arrested and nearly 70 persons injured.

WASHINGTON — Congress returns today from a month-long summer recess to a crowded calendar, a burgeoning scandal, a Panama Canal controversy and enough contentious issues to keep the House and Senate in session until January.
But they hope to adjourn in mid-October.
Several pressing matters must be acted on as soon as possible. A 1974 law says the budget resolution must be in effect by Sept. 15 for the new fiscal year which starts Oct. 1. That is the major item of business for both bodies in the first week back.
At least three hearings were planned this week, beginning today, on the banking and financial transactions of Budget Director Bert Lance.
Meanwhile, heads of state or other high-ranking representatives from 24 Latin American countries were arriving in Washington for gala ceremonies surrounding the signing of the two new Panama Canal treaties, which face a tough fight for Senate ratification.
Sen. James Allen, D-Ala., man of the Senate Judiciary report of powers subcommittee open hearings on the treaty tomorrow with former Gov. Jimmy Carter, a foe of the pact, as the witness.
All but four of the 13 regular appropriations bills needed to run the government operating in the new fiscal year have been sent to the White House. Under the budget law, work on the remaining four must be completed by Oct. 12.
The bills contain emotional provisions which leaders have so far been unable to resolve, such as government-financed abortion, bomber construction money, whether to ban aid to nations meeting recognized human rights standards.
Speaker Thomas O'Neill pledged to push through the bill this year to increase the minimum wage from its current \$2.30 an hour to \$2.65 an hour, include automatic annual increases. The measure faces heavy opposition.
