Evidence showed Gray was killed by a shot fired by another officer. There was no evidence Blansett fired the shotgun he carried during the conviction for a 1963 offense bethe attempted breakout.

The Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday rejected Blansett's appeal, however, saying Blansett could be convicted of capital murder in the case because his intentional actions — going armed to the jail to attempt to free a prisoner — caused Gray's death.

In another case, the appellate court overturned the life sentence given John F. Gutierrez of Lubbock for his part in a July 12, 1975, jailbreak. Gutierrez and a cell mate sawed through a support bar of their cell and used the bar and a knife to subdue a jailer, then freed eight other prisoners and escaped.

Gutierrez was sentenced to life on tenced to 40 years in prison.

By a 78-4 vote, the Senate

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
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
