## Two medical students receive scholarships

Medical students Timothy Field of Plainview and Jay Franklin of Tyler were named Friday to receive new \$1,500 scholarships made available to Texas A&M University's first class of medical students.

Field, a 1977 magna cum laude graduate of Texas A&M, was selected as initial recipient of the Harrison Scholarship established by local physician Dr. Richard Harrison III, a 1947 Texas A&M graduate, to honor his father, Dr. R. H. Harrison. Harrison presented the award.

Franklin was initial recipient of the Dr. Sam Houston Sanders Scholarship established by Sanders, a 1922 Texas A&M graduate and now a physician in Memphis.

Both scholarships were endowed with \$30,000 gifts to the University. At the ceremonies, it was announced that Tarleton State University graduate Garry Anderson of Stephenville would attend medical classes here at the \$2,000 Frank A. and Gladys F. Chamberlin Scholarship awarded a student from Erath County. Anderson graduated this year from TSU with a perfect 4.0 grade point ratio.

In addition, 10 of the 32-member charter class were recognized for top academic achievement and each received a \$300 merit award. They included Anderson, Gary Latson of Amarillo, Robert Luedecke of Corpus Christi, Scott Orth of Houston, Mark Sicilio of College Station, John Ulrey and Joel Vogt of Pasadena, Patricia Watson of Houston, Leslie Webb of Odessa and Thomas Wheeler of Seguin. Dean of Medicine James Knight also recognized other scholarship holders among the 32 students; including President's Endowed Scholars Rudd and Schmidt of Fort Worth. As President's Endowed Scholars, Rudd and Schmidt were chosen while still in high school to receive the \$1,250-per-year awards. Texas A&M's group of medical students may be the youngest in the nation. Entering an accelerated program, they average two years younger (age 20) than the national norm for beginning medical students. The students also rank higher academically with an average grade point ratio of 3.83 on a 4.0 system. Women comprise 21 per cent of the first Texas A&M medical class.

## SWC ends second week of

It was officially the busiest Southwest Conference line nine games, five wins, four ties.  
But it was more than just wins.

It was the day that the Cougars lost the soul of the offense, quarterback Danny Dwyer, as well as a game to the Penn State Nittany Lions.

It was the day that fullback Campbell re-arrived at the University of Texas and encouraged to start thinking about the horns meeting with Oklahoma weeks hence.

It was the day nationally Texas Tech survived an attempt to register its second win of the season.

And it was the day that TCU and TCU, two teams nowhere, played the drama seen in these parts in recent years.

For the record: Oregon 29 TCU 24  
In a little more than three hours the Ducks and Horned Frogs accumulated 214 yards in play and committed a combined 11 turnovers.

Early in the final quarter, linebacker Steve Barber, in his helmet in his hand, dived the bench and tackled the linebacker Kenny Bryant, in the process of running for a yard.

It was officially recorded as a fumble interception return.  
As if that wasn't enough, scored three times in just one minute to tie the game. In minutes left, but the Horned Frogs were done in by a safety and goal to lose, 29-24. It was the straight loss, the longest streak of inability in major football.

Oh, yes. On the extra play after Oregon's first touchdown, a 57-yard punt return by Grant — place kicker Roy — booted the ball out of the end zone and the ball struck an unsuspecting female security guard in the stomach under a shade tree in a soft drink.

TCU has won only one of 34 games. This year's season off poorly for the Horned Frogs when they lost to SMU 45-14.

Horned Frog Coach F. said last week that his team shown enough fight in the game and replaced nine starters before the Oregon contest.

His team apparently took a break since a brief brawl erupted in the third quarter which left both benches and took the full complement of officials and coaches to stop.

Penn State 31 Houston 14  
Houston, which had won UCLA last Monday night, lost to Penn State all day, lost and will be without the services of six weeks because of a separated shoulder.

Texas 68 Virginia 0  
Earl Campbell ran for 159 yards in less than two quarters. Texas (2-0) clobbered Virginia. The victory gave the 13th Longhorns a 2-0 record and creased their point production to 113. Texas has been scored on.

Baylor 21 Kentucky 6  
Baylor's defense shut the Kentucky while the Bears took advantage of Wildcats' turnover to win their first game of the 21-6. Baylor Coach Grant To send in Sam Bieckham at back after freshman starter Smith sustained an injured der.

Arkansas 25 Okla. State 6  
Arkansas (2-0) showed surprising strength in bumping off Oklahoma State, 28-6. Arkansas running Ben Cowins, gained more than 100 yards. Total yards gained were most identical with Arkansas' 425 yards to OSU's 390 as Arkansas defense shut the Cowboys' goal line.

Texas Tech 49 New Mexico St. 14  
Eighth-rated Texas Tech shook off early troubles to New Mexico, 49-14. The Tech went into the locker room at facing a 14-14 tie. Tech quarterback Rodney Allison came back third quarter to score twice to pass to Split End Sandy Whit and a second time a few minutes later on a 16-yard run.

Florida 48 Rice 3  
On the gloomy side for the conference, Rice (1-1) was host Florida, 48-3. Rice running Earl Cooper suffered from the ties as he fumbled three times. Florida tuned all three corners into scores.

NTSU 24 SMU 13  
Southern Methodist (1-1) was easy victim of North Texas 24-13, bringing revenge for Texas coach Hayden Fry, who fired by SMU five seasons ago.
