### Accreditation team reviews special areas

### His and her windmills — only from Neimans

DALLAS — It is likely that the folks who live year-around in the rugged Palo Duro Canyon country of West Texas did not understand what all those beautiful women and cigarette-ad looking men were doing a few months back.

There they were — men and women — dressed in \$4,000 leather and Russian sable coats, pretending they belonged on the granite cliffs overlooking the canyon while photographers snapped all around them. They must have felt out of place.

The results, however, the photographs, make this year's Neiman-Marcus Christmas Book something special. Looking past the models, the expensive clothes, most people can find something they never thought would be available in this catalog for people who don't mind spending \$175 for a hard hat plated in 24K gold.

The photographs, you see, are free. And they are worth looking at. Everything else in the catalog is expensive, and much of it — such as the tennis ball can which looks like a barber pole (\$15) — is worth chuckling at.

Every year the Dallas-based department store presents a his-her gift which no one matches for outlandishness. This year it is his-hers urban windmills. The pair costs \$32,000 from Dallas-Fort Worth, not including installation. However, Neiman-Marcus points out, the windmills can pay for themselves.

"In an area with an average wind velocity of 12 miles an hour (Boston, for example), Her Windmill would generate more than enough wattage to brew her morning coffee, Benedict an egg, heat her hair rollers, soothe her psyche with stereo and

give her bronze beauty while she relaxes under the sun lamp," the catalog said.

One other special is worthy mention, the "Walk with Legend N-M's Lincoln Safari" for \$30,000.

The 7-day expedition for 12 people begins in Springfield, Ill. The guides include an honor guard of the Illinois Fifth Cavalry Regiment and noted actor and Lincoln scholar Richard Blake. The party will meet with Illinois Gov. James Thompson, tour the Lincoln farm stay at the presidential suite in Springfield, camp in Civil War territory throughout the week, Blake and his wife, dressed as Mr. Lincoln and Mrs. Lincoln, will recreate famous speeches and moments of Lincoln at the original locations.

The catalog also advertises scarves, jewelry, china, robes, underwear games and other such products.
