SENIOR RING ORDERING PROCEDURE

For Students Completing 92 Hours at the End of the Fall '77 Semester
 To be eligible to order the Texas A&M Senior Class Ring, an undergraduate student must have at least ninety-two (92) semester hours, with 30 hours at A&M and be in good standing with the University. To order at mid-semester using mid-semester grades to fulfill the above requirements, please note the following instructions:

1. Leave your name, major and I.D. number with the Ring Clerk, Room Seven, Richard Coke Building, prior to November 10th. THIS MAY NOT BE DONE BY PHONE.
2. Bring mid-semester grade report along when ready to order to verify eligibility.
3. All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Senior Ring loans are available through student financial aid in the YMCA Building.
4. Anyone having failed to leave their name in advance and fail to bring their mid-semester grade report when ready to order will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked.
5. Mid-semester orders will be taken only from October 26th until November 30th, 1977.
6. Students who do not place their order during this period may order after final grades are posted.
7. The Ring Clerk is on duty from 8 A.M. to 5 P.M. each day, Monday through Friday. However, in order for other duties to be carried out, absolutely no orders will be taken between 11:30 A.M. - 1:30 P.M. or between 4:00 - 5:00 p.m.
8. All rings ordered, regardless of whether on October 26th or November 30th, will be delivered on the same day which will be approximately January 31, 1978.

(This November 30th ordering dead-line does not apply to those students who completed 92 hours prior to the beginning of the Fall '77 semester. After a student has 92 hours on record there is never a dead-line, except a monthly mailing date on which we send ring orders to the factory.) 34130

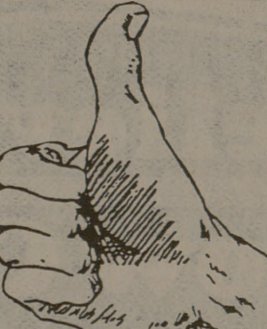

Six (weekend) ways to keep from studying

• While you're in Houston for the Texas A&M-Rice football game (Saturday 7:30 p.m.) remember there's a Corps Parade in downtown Houston at 2 p.m. Saturday.

• After (or before) the game, you'll have to try one of the restaurants our resident gourmet recommends. Ouisie's Table and the Traveling Brown Bag Lunch Company, 1708 Sunset, is the first. Besides a trout dish, and oyster dishes, there is always a special treat. Open until midnight. Inexpensive to moderate prices. The second is Ruggles, 2006 Westheimer, with its hanging plants and stained glass windows. The atmosphere is great for an uncomplicated evening with good food. They have a bar, and are open from 6 p.m. to 3 a.m. Moderate prices.

• After the game, you may want to visit some of Houston's night spots. Gilley's Club, 4500 Spencer Hwy., is still the best of C&W dance clubs. Open from 4 p.m. to 2 a.m., with shows starting at 9:15. Cover charge varies. Then there's Grif's Shillelagh Inn, 3416 Roseland (just off Montrose Blvd.). This is a rowdy beer joint where you can sit around and discuss the game. Open 11 p.m. to 2 a.m. No cover charge. Also, the Texas Opry House, 1416 Richmond. This is a beer hall-turned-bar, with lots of progressive country and western music. Open 4 p.m. to 2 a.m. Cover charge varies.

• If you'd like a place just a little quieter, then Cody's, 3400 Montrose (at Hawthorne) is the place for you. The tenth floor view of the Houston skyline is

beautiful. Live entertainment, quiet atmosphere, and a cocktail terrace overlooking downtown Houston. They also serve dinner until midnight. Open until 1 p.m. Moderate prices. And of course, Theodore's 19th Century Fox, 304 Avondale (at Westheimer in Montrose). They have a multitude of plants and small tables, and a relaxing atmosphere. Open until 2 p.m. No cover charge.

But what if you don't plan on going to Houston for the game?

• Zarape Mexican Restaurant, 311 McArthur at University Dr., is open until 9 p.m. Besides some terrific food, they also serve beer and wine. Prices are inexpensive to moderate.

• The MSC Bowling Alley is another possibility. They're open from 8 a.m. to 1 a.m. (Fr-Sa)

TSA meeting held here this spring

Texas A&M University will be site of the Texas Student Association convention to be held next spring according to students who attended last week's TSA meeting in Denton.

Representatives of 12 Texas schools attended the conference which was held at North Texas University. Keynote speakers were Price Daniel, Jr. and Joe Claiborne, former chairman of the State Bar of Insurance.

Workshops held for students delegates covered topics such as tenant-landlord relationships, financial aid, and grants. Texas had the largest number of delegates (15), and reports of the convention will be given at the November Student Senate meeting.

The general assembly passed a resolution supporting the International Women's Year conference to be held next month in Houston as well as a resolution to support affirmative action programs. A bill was passed which allowed the join the Texas Coalition Against Death Penalty. TSA also voted support of the creation of the Agency for Consumer Protection.

Cool weather good to crop livestock haul

Cool, dry weather of the week has enhanced harvest operations but added to the decline in range and livestock conditions. Texas Agricultural Extension Service vice reported Wednesday.

The report said harvesting of cotton, sorghum and soybeans progressed well in the High Plains and Rolling Plains, west central and west Texas. Peanuts harvested in the central and eastern areas and soybeans also harvested in northeast and east Texas.

However, the continued weather is causing many farmers and ranchers to reduce cattle because of poor grazing conditions. Supplemental feeding also is being placed in southern and western areas.
