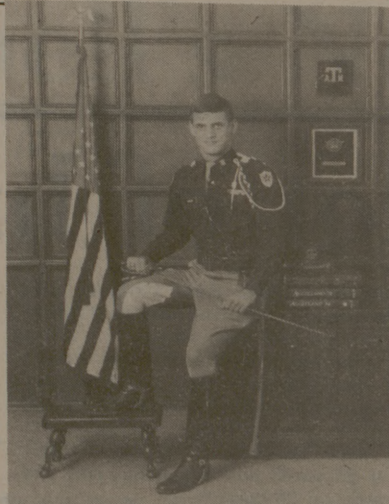

Seventy-two juniors of the Texas A&M University's Corps of Cadets, were inducted into the Ross Volunteers on Tuesday.

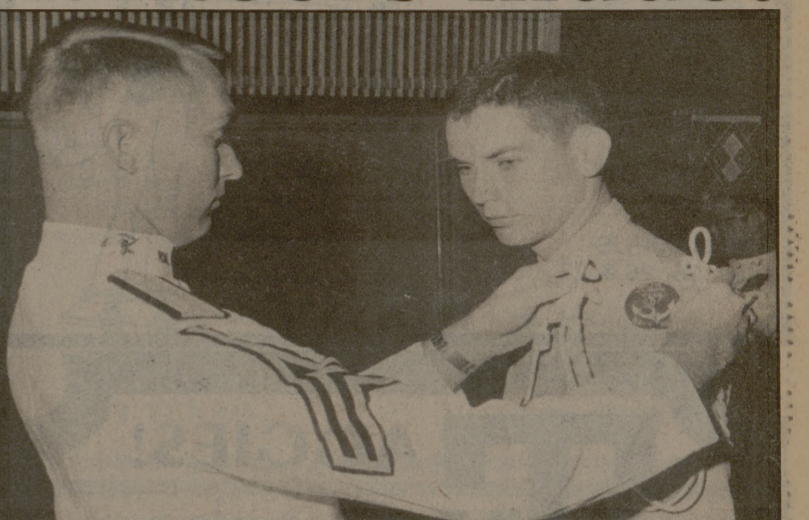
RV Commander Bill Rademacher led ceremonies in which new members donned the yellow and white citation cord and ribbon of the company.

Air Force Col. Glenn A. Jones, a 1961 Texas A&M graduate and former RV commander, spoke at the company's induction banquet.

Special guests included President and Mrs. Jarvis Miller, Mrs. Elizabeth Cook, and Jones' daughter Kathy.

The Ross Volunteers first began in 1887, and were known as the Scott Rifles. During the Texas A&M presidency of Gov. Lawrence Sullivan Ross, the unit adopted its present name.

Program at A&M to assist with animal control problem

Texas A&M University will soon be the home of the largest animal control information service in the nation.

While the service is initially programmed to service Texas, eventually it will reach out to the entire country.

"The idea is to gather information on the various aspects of animal control operation," said Ron Wallace, spokesman for Texas A&M's Center for Urban Programs. "This service will assist animal control officials in handling animal control problems or by providing the necessary information."

This type of information is needed

quickly in emergencies such as an outbreak of rabies or other animal vectored diseases.

The ACIS program is scheduled to become operational in February, 1978. In the meantime, the researchers gather information from state health departments, state agriculture, departments research firms, pet food companies, humane societies and from municipal and county animal control departments.

The information is collected, sorted and put into computer banks. When finished, a completely annotated index of the information will be made available to each subscribing group or facility.

Some of the general areas of research for information are rabies, surgical sterilization, euthanasia, census techniques, local ordinances, county and state laws, animal handling, capture techniques and equipment. Education material, maintenance procedures in shelters, building plans and specifications, disposing of animals, communications, and the costs of animal control operation are also included.

The project is a joint operation conducted by the Center for Urban Programs in conjunction with the Sterling C. Evans Library at Texas A&M University.
