New map dispersal approved by Council

Highly detailed maps will be at the disposal of all visitors to the Bryan-College Station area in area motels, courtesy of the College Station City Council.
In regular session Wednesday afternoon, the council approved with some reservation the design for a new area map. It had appropriated \$1,700 to the joint venture with area businessmen that will provide maps in all participating motels and money lending institutions.
Mayor Lorence Bravenec said the map did not fairly represent the transportation industry in College Station.
Bravenec contended that the map over-emphasized the importance of the Coulter airfield versus Easterwood, and omitted the Greyhound Bus Terminal in College Station.
Henry Hawley, representing the Chamber of Commerce agreed to add the terminal locations to the

map, but said the designated Coulter Field had to remain in the map to be accurate.
Bravenec then asked if Chamber of Commerce representative was aware that the "Welcome Bryan" sign recently erected by Chamber was within College Station city limits and did not conform to the city's sign ordinance.
"I was not aware that was the situation," Hawley said in response to the allegations. "I will certainly look into this matter."
In other business, the council approved a contract for grave services at the city cemetery. It also approved three final plats for subdivision construction and really considered of an ordinance requiring motorcyclists to wear helmets within city limits. The council will meet in regular session at 7:30 in the council chamber City Hall.

SENIOR RING ORDERING PROCEDURE
For Students Completing 92 Hours at the End of the Fall '77 Semester
To be eligible to order the Texas A&M Senior Class Ring, an undergraduate student must have at least ninety-two (92) semester hours, with 30 hours at A&M and be in good standing with the University. To order at mid-semester using mid-semester grades to fulfill the above requirements, please note the following instructions:
1. Leave your name, major and I.D. number with the Ring Clerk, Room Seven, Richard Coke Building, prior to November 10th. THIS MAY NOT BE DONE BY PHONE.
2. Bring mid-semester grade report along when ready to order to verify eligibility.
3. All rings must be paid for in full when the order is placed. Senior Ring loans are available through student financial aid in the YMCA Building.
4. Anyone having failed to leave their name in advance and fail to bring their mid-semester grade report when ready to order will be asked to return later to allow time for records to be checked.
5. Mid-semester orders will be taken only from October 26th until November 30th, 1977.
6. Students who do not place their order during this period may order after final grades are posted.
7. The Ring Clerk is on duty from 8 A.M. to 5 P.M. each day, Monday through Friday. However, in order for other duties to be carried out, absolutely no orders will be taken between 11:30 A.M. - 1:30 P.M. or between 4:00 - 5:00 p.m.
8. All rings ordered, regardless of whether on October 26th or November 30th, will be delivered on the same day which will be approximately January 31, 1978.
(This November 30th ordering deadline does not apply to those students who completed 92 hours prior to the beginning of the Fall '77 semester. After a student has 92 hours on record there is never a dead-line, except a monthly mailing date on which we send ring orders to the factory.) 3430

Elephant hunters use off rockets and grass fire

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — The methods range from shooting them with rockets to burning them to death in huge grass fires.
Wildlife conservationists say ivory hunters killed between 100,000 and 400,000 elephants in 1976 in Africa, threatening to send the majestic creature the same route to extinction as the blue whale.
Iain Douglas-Hamilton, an international authority on elephants, told the World Wilderness Congress Tuesday that something must be done to check the demand for ivory to protect the elephant.
Douglas-Hamilton said that in Chad, on the southern fringe of the Sahara, there were reports the army had used rockets to fire at elephants from helicopters in the race to feed the world ivory market.
"In Sudan I have received very recent reports that some tribes are still burning elephants to death by setting alight the long grass around a

herd," said Douglas-Hamilton, who is based in Kenya.
"In all Africa, ivory leaving 1976 may have come from among between 100,000 and 400,000 elephants and there seems to be letup in the demand," he said.
Douglas-Hamilton said he was at the figures "after weighing thousands of tusks in Dar Salaam's (Tanzania) weighing rooms."
He said the estimate would correct if the tusks weighed in Es Salaam "were representative of tusks all over the continent."
He also said he included natural causes and who were in countries like South Africa, Rhodesia.
Douglas-Hamilton said elephants had been seriously "over-exploited" particularly since the 10-fold rise in the price of ivory since the 1960s.
