NEW ORLEANS — An Arizona pilot lost power in his single-engine plane Sunday night and set it down in a marshy region on the eastern edge of the city.

The Coast Guard said Douglas Ezell of Prescott, Ariz., was rescued unhurt from the Cessna 210.

He was taken to West Jefferson General Hospital and released after a brief medical examination.

The plane clipped a 250,000-volt power line as it descended, causing a temporary loss of electricity in some neighborhoods near the landing site.

The nine teams competing in the event represented land-grant universities from throughout the United States.

Sandra J. New received a \$275 National AZ Scholarship. She is a student of Texas A&M University and is an animal science major from Bay City, Texas.

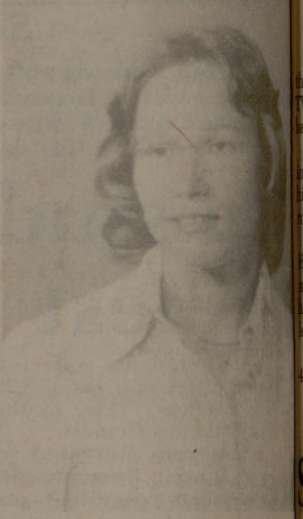
Meats judges win top honor in contest
