Carter welcomes Shah of Iran amid angry young Iranians

WASHINGTON — Police teargassed angry young Iranian demonstrators outside the White House Tuesday as President Carter, weeping from the fumes, welcomed Iran's Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi for talks on weapons and oil.

The masked, stick-wielding opponents of the shah broke through lines of mounted police on the

grassy Ellipse behind the White House and attacked a nearby group of shah supporters as the greeting music and cannon salute died down.

On the White House lawn, Carter winced and tears rolled down his cheeks from the gas. He welcomed the shah as "a long-time friend of our country."

There were no reports of injuries or arrests, although one horse was

knocked to its knees then struck by a hurled trash can.

The shah, denying that torture exists in his country, had described his vociferous opponent in this country as "Marxists."

Shouting "down with the shah," more than 1,000 opponents had demonstrated loudly but peacefully since before dawn on the Ellipse and in Lafayette Square on the other side of the White House.

But when the Iranian ruler arrived by limousine instead of by helicopter as planned, the anti-shah demonstrators on the Ellipse broke through protective police lines and attacked quieter and older shah supporters with sticks.

Police waded in and broke up the fighting.

Both Carter and the shah kept their composure and delivered their greeting statements as guests and reporters gaggled and winced from the smoke bombs.

and Empress Farah and Mrs. Carter dabbled their eyes constantly.

"It is a great honor for us to be with us his imperial majesty in Iran, a long-time friend of our country," said Carter.

Later, during a ceremony in a grand hallway of the White House, Carter apologized to the shah for the temporary air pollution.


Carter said in his welcoming remarks the shah had known an American president since Franklin Roosevelt.

"It is a great honor for me to have him come during the first year of my presidency," he said.

"When the Shah took over leadership of his nation 26 years ago, Iran was occupied by a foreign power." During the Shah's reign, Carter said, "The growth of Iran into a position of world leadership has been remarkable."

Texas A&M University Town Hall presents

Ronnie Milsap and Asleep at the Wheel will kick off the week of activities that will end with the Texas A&M vs. Texas University football game. On Tuesday night, November 22, these two groups will perform at 8:15 p.m. in G. Rollie White Coliseum, as a Town Hall Special Attraction.

Overnight success came to Ronnie Milsap in 1974 when he was named Male Vocalist of the Year by the Country Music Association and also received a Grammy award for Top Male Country Performer. Today Milsap is still in the spotlight as he recently received the 1977 Country Western Entertainer of the Year Award.

Although Milsap studied classical music in school, there was no stopping his interest in rock and roll, blues, and country that he obtained as a boy. During his high school years at the State School for the Blind in Raleigh, North Carolina, Ronnie formed his own rock band, The Apparitions, with three other blind students.

To the delight of all audiences, Ronnie's shows include definite strains of blues, rock, and classical lines in his country songs. He feels, "Country music speaks of life and shows emotion that other forms can't project. A country song has the power to make you laugh or cry; it relates more closely with the people than any other form of music. I try to reach from as far left to as far right as I can in my music. I don't like to stay just in the middle. I like to play hillbilly one minute and rock and roll the next — something that sounds like 1940 one minute and 1999 the next. I know for me, I'm happy with my life and what I do. I don't have to see to play or sing and to feel the love of the people."


Opening the concert will be Asleep at the Wheel. The small country rock band was formed in the early 1970's on the East Coast. Soon their music developed into what is known as Western Swing, which first spread through Texas in the 1930's.

Asleep at the Wheel moved to Austin in 1974 and played to numerous warm and responsive audiences. Several of their albums including *Texas Gold* and *Wheelin' and Dealin'* hit both the country and pop charts. The band has become an eleven-member group now with the addition of a second fiddler, giving the group that twin fiddle sound which typifies Western Swing music.

Neither Ronnie Milsap nor Asleep at the Wheel are new to A&M. Milsap gave an overwhelming performance to Aggies last spring, while Asleep at the Wheel returns from 1975. Both are expected to entertain young and old alike, whether you love country western or blues and rock. So ya'll come and bring your friends.
