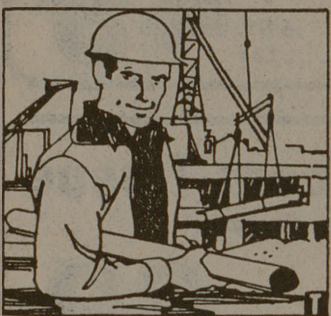


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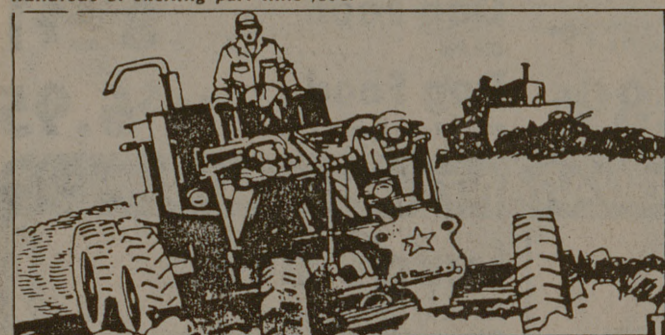
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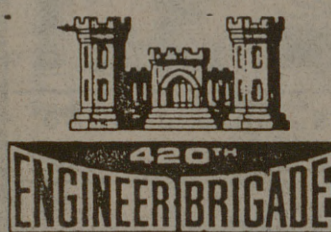
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**Trash heap**

**Group to fight fanatics**

United Press International LUBBOCK — Richard Arnold has had it with what he calls a vocal minority that has gained influence and power "beyond the point of social benefit."

He's counteracting with PUFF — People United to Fight Fanatics — and its first operation is aimed against antimokers who have brought about non-smoking rules.

"I really don't know what I'm going to do, if you want to know the truth," said the 35 year-old restaurant owner. "I'm just tired of being pushed around by government legislation. The fact just struck me that I was tired of this garbage."

The past several years have seen the concentrated efforts of many small special interest groups begin to infringe on the lifestyles of the American people," he said. "These groups, though small in number, have attained power and influence that has reached far beyond the point of social benefit."

"What's happened to the silent majority? That's what PUFF is all about."

PUFF originated on a flight from Phoenix to Lubbock when an attendant told Arnold and his wife to snuff out their cigarettes in a non-smoking section. But he said he was there because the smoking seats were filled and only one passenger was sitting in the non-smoking area.

The more they thought about it, the more irritated they got. And they started thinking about all the other rules they didn't like. PUFF was an outgrowth of the frustration.

"The time has come to call a halt to this idiosyncrasy," he said. "We can no longer stand by and hope that laws against smoking will not have an effect on our whole society. Who will be the next to be legislated out of existence? The garlic eater? The person who doesn't bathe as often as he should? The parents of unborn children?"

Arnold said smoking should be a personal choice — and not legislated. He favors revised rules regulating smoking on public transportation and proposes smoking in crowded, unventilated areas.

But PUFF isn't limited to the smoking issue.

"We just happen to have the vehicle — smoking — to start jumping up and down about," he said. "The basic other thing I would like to see after is the 55 mile per hour speed limit. I'm a firm believer that the embargo, the gas shortage was farce."

Arnold would like to see the smokers and non-smokers work together to fight legislation that infringes on their rights. He has a man in Washington to keep PUFF informed of "social legislation" and signed an advertising agency for billboard and newspaper campaigns next year to publicize the organization.

Since its inception early this year, PUFF has grown to 2,500 members across the United States and has received about \$18,000 in donations. Arnold is going to sell one of his restaurants and leave the other to a capable manager so he and his wife can devote themselves fulltime to PUFF, which is opening an office in a downtown skyscraper.
