"The early team fouls hurt us a lot," coach Wanda Bender said. "Susan had her best game of the season when she replaced Werner late in the first half."
In the second half, the Ags started coming to life after being down by eight. With 4:09 left in the game, the women took the lead and eventually won it by seven.

The A&M women finished the game hitting 48 percent of their shots, while Texas connected on only 39 percent.
Bender said her girls had been practicing four to five hours a night for this game. She added that they were now in the best physical condition that she had ever seen them in this season.

The sellout crowd of 7,500 seemed to help the Ag's spirits and give them the added incentive to win.
"It makes the girls want to give it their best shot," Bender said.
In the second half, the women took control of the game. Bender said the Texas game plan did not hold any surprises for them. She

added that the team had spent at least 40 minutes each night working on their press.
"The effort of the yell leaders at our game was also a great factor in the win," Bender said. She added that she was very pleased with their presence.

Aggie tracksters finish fourth

The Texas A&M men's track team finished fourth in a quadrangular meet in Baton Rouge, La.

The Aggies competed against Alabama, LSU and the University of Houston. Alabama won the meet with 60 points followed by LSU with 39, Houston 38 and A&M 15.

Manfred Kohrs had the only first place for the Aggies, winning the mile run with a time of 4:15.22. Other Aggie finishers were Billy Busch who finished third in the 60-yard high hurdles with a time of 7.65, Pat Reuhle taking third place in the pole vault with a jump of 16 feet and Lane Mitchell finished third in the three mile run with a time of 14:19.76. Karl Figgs finished fourth in the 600-yard run with a time of 1:13.23 and Mike Whitwell took fourth place in the high jump with a leap of 6-5.

"We didn't run very well," coach Ted Nelson said. Nelson attributed the poor performance to the lay off over the holidays and the bad weather last week.

"It's early in the season and we should improve by giving the younger guys experience," Nelson said.

Out of the 19 men that went seven were freshmen.

Although the Aggies had a poor showing in Baton Rouge, Nelson feels the team will be a top contender for the Southwest Conference indoor track championship February 17 in Fort Worth.



Nelson added the meet in Oklahoma City will have 25 teams from around the country and will be a little more competitive.

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
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
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
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
