

City Council approves \$3.5 million bond sale

Acceptance of a bid by Rotan Mosle, Inc. for the sale of \$3,525,000 in bonds was approved unanimously by the College Station City Council Wednesday night.

A total of six bids were received with Rotan Mosle offering the lowest effective interest rate of 4.95 per-

cent. This compares with the current national average interest rate on bonds of 5.74 percent.

\$90,000 received from the sale of the bonds will be used for construction of a line connecting the College Station and Bryan sewerage treatment plants, said City Manager North Bardell.

Another \$650,000 which has not

been funded, will be required to extend the College Station sewer lines to Northgate.

Although the Northgate area lies within the College Station city limits, its sewer system is serviced by the Bryan sewerage treatment plant. The area has experienced problems with sewage overloads in the past.

Acceptance of a \$317,950 bid by Fairbairn Electric, Inc. of Corpus Christi for electrical construction in the College Station substation and switching station also was approved unanimously by the city council.

The construction will enable College Station to take an additional 20 megawatts of load from Gulf States beginning June 1978.
