'Robinson Crusoe' performed Feb. 16

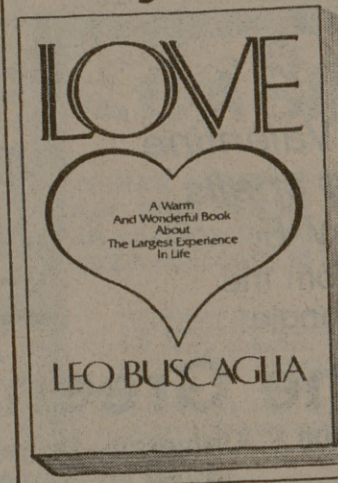
The Texas Opera Theater will present the comic opera "Robinson Crusoe" in Rudder Auditorium on Thursday, Feb. 16.

Business fellowship awarded to student

Gordon C. Bruner of Fort Worth has been selected for a Nelle White and Charles Henderson Seawall Memorial Fellowship for graduate students in business administration at Texas A&M University.

Bruner earned a B.B.A. in marketing in 1976 from Texas A&M, where he held an overall grade point ratio of 3.6 and was a member of Beta Gamma Sigma and Phi Kappa Phi honor societies.

The fellowship honors two Houston residents and was established in 1971 by Belle Patterson Elam and Elizabeth Elam Roth, also of Houston.

Bruner, now studying for a master's degree in marketing, resides at 3008 San Marcos in Fort Worth.

Deep ocean miner joins engineering

John E. "Jack" Flipse, specialist in deep ocean mining, has joined Texas A&M University's ocean engineering faculty as a visiting professor.

Flipse will teach and conduct research in the coastal, hydraulic

and ocean engineering group of the Civil Engineering Department. He will also be involved with Dr. John B. Herbich in work of the Center for Dredging studies.

Flipse and Herbich have cooperated in deep ocean mining activities. The new faculty member was earlier a visiting professor for Texas A&M short course.

Formerly board chairman and president of Deepsea Ventures Inc. at Gloucester Point, Va., Flipse is expected to continue participation with the Marine Board of the National Research Council in Washington, D.C., and the U.S. Interagency Advisory Committee on the Law of the Sea.

The former New York State Maritime College professor holds a bachelor's degree in naval architecture and marine engineering from Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a master's in mechanical engineering from New York University.

Flipse was a senior engineer and engineering head with Sperry Gyroscope Co., where he was in development, test and manufacture of fin-type gyroscopic ship stabilizers.

He joined the Newport News Shipyard in 1957 as research engineer and research committee chairman, and became Deepsea Ventures president in 1968.

National Engineers Week scheduled Feb. 19-25

Mayors of Bryan and College Station officially sanctioned the upcoming National Engineers Week Friday by honoring organizations which will sponsor the Feb. 19-25 observance at Texas A&M University.

Proclamations commending the Brazos chapter of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers and the National Society of Professional Engineers were signed by Lloyd Joyce of Bryan and Lorence Bravenc of College Station.

One of the highlights of the week will be the TSPE banquet Feb. 23 at which the Engineer of the Year and Young Engineer of the Year will be announced.

To draw the public's attention to the functions, responsibilities and challenges of engineering, professional organizations across the country schedule expositions similar to the one which will be headquartered in Zachry Engineering Center on the Texas A&M campus.

Student engineering groups have also planned displays, a dance and a paper airplane exhibit.

This year's theme for Engineers Week is "Engineers — Strength in Crisis."

This year's celebration has been planned to coincide with George Washington's birthday, since 1978 is the 200th anniversary of his call for formal education in engineering.

Meat judging team places second in Fort Worth

Texas A&M University won second place and produced the overall high point individual in the South-

western Intercollegiate Meat Judging Contest just ended in Fort Worth.

The event, sponsored by the National Live Stock and Meat Board, was held in conjunction with the Southwestern Exposition and Fair Stock Show Jan. 25-Feb. 6.

Colorado State University was the contest's first place team, with Texas going to the University of Nebraska.
