have to know more about breeding wild animals in captivity," Seager added. "So, the first thing we'll try is to learn more about the natural breeding environment that has been taken from them. We're just scratching the surface. We'll then try to establish some sort of national semen bank and then an international one.

'In today's world, zoos have a greater responsibility than just being places to exhibit animals," Seager said.


